LINER HESPERIAN TORPEDOED BUT ESCAPES-LOSS OF LIFE ABOUT EIGHT.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5. The American Consul at Queens-town has cabled the State Department as follows: The Allan Liner Hesperian was torpedoed by a German submarine 70 miles S.W. of Fastnet at 8.30 Saturday evening. One or two Americans were on board, none were lost. The loss of life is about eight. The vessel was not sunk, and the Admiralty boats landed the passengers and troops at 8.30 this morning, and has returned to bring the Hesperian here. She is due about 9 o'clock to-morrow morning. There were about forty-five Canadian troops on board, unorganized, mainly invalided, also one 4.7 gun mounted, was visible at the stern of the vessel. She was bound to Montreal.

Queenstown, Sept. 5.—The Hesperian, outward bound from Liverperian, outward bound from Liverpool for Montreal, carried 700 passengers and crew. There were about 50 in the first cabin, 150 in the second, 250 in the third, with 250 in crew. It is asserted that at 8.30 last night, about 100 miles S.W. of the Fastnet, a German submarine torpedoed the Hesperian without warning. The torpedo struck forward of the engine room, tearing away the forward compartments. Boats go away quickly, the gerater number being well filled. Among the passengers were many wounded Canadian soldiers returning to their homes. Wireless calls soon brought a fleet of rescue steamers to their aid. J. H. There were about 600 persons aboard, of whor 350 were passengers; all were saved. The submarine is supposed to have been chasing the Hesperian, and. coming up as darkness was falling, torpedoed her. The passengers arriving here declare that the attack was so sudden that great alarm was caused aboard the steamer.

London, Sept. 5.- Major J. S. Barres, who was returning to Canada with twelve officers and thirty-eight men to recuperate from wounds, said concerning the torpedoing, that perfect order prevailed. One boat cap-sized through the falls getting jainmed, someone cutting the ropes to facilitate the lowering of the boat. The Hesperian, according to Capt.
Main, was one hundred and thirty miles west of Queenstown when she

Queenstown, Sept. 5. — Ronald Whiteway, of London, who, with his wife, was a passenger on the Hesperian, said: "We were sitting on the upper deck, when about 8.30 on Saturday evening we felt a violent impact, which almost knocked us out of our charts. In less time than I can tell it, a huge volume of water rose almost as high as the masts, and breaking, drenched us to the skin. We thought we were out of the dan-We thought we were out of the danger zone, and were discussing the possibility of a pleasant voyage. Life possibility of a pleasant voyage. Life boats were lowered and rowed away from the steamer, on which the captain, officers and some of the crew remained. The steamer was apparently struck on the starboard side, but as it was nearly dark, the torpedo could not be seen. After the explosion, the Hesperian settled down by the head. Rescue steamers were seen on the scene and took the passen on the scene and took the passen. soon on the scene and took the pas-sengers on board."

PEACE IMPOSSIBLE.

MILAN, Sept. 5. The Italian press, links together Germany's modification of her submarine policy and Pope Benedict's peace efforts, expressing the view that Germany desires to have President Wilson further the wishes of the Pope. The Secolo remarks that the very reasons which might make peace desirable for Germany would cause it to be disastrous to the Allies. Peace at the present moment of victory for Germany, this newspaper says, be giving impunity to-day and tri-umph to-morrow to German militarism. The opinion is expressed by the Secolo that President Wilson, while expressing appreciation of the Pope's move, will postpone any effort of his own for two years.
