Springfield, Mass., Sept. 8.—The caucus results received by the Springfield Republican up to one o'clock this morning, renders Butler's defeat by a decisive majority in Wednesday's convention absolutely certain.

Madrid, Sept. 8.—The new Ministry is announced today. It is constituted as follows: Senor Castelar, President, without portfolio; Senor Carvajal, Minister of Foreign Affairs; Senor Berges, Minister of Justice; Senor Pedregal, Minister of Finance; Senor Cervantes, Minister of Public Works; Senor General Danchez Bregua, Minister of War; Senor Oreiro, Minister of Marine; Senor Matorrera, Minister of the Interior; Senor Salor, Minister of the Colonies.

New York, Sept. 8.—This evening the steamer St. John was leaving on her trip to Albany, two brothers named Daniel D. and Chas. J. Mahanny, who had delayed on the boat, attempted to jump ashore. Daniel fell into the river, and his wife, who was on the pier, saw the accident and began to cry for help. Charles Mahanny also fell into the river, and the passengers on the boat crowded to the side to see what was the matter, the gate gave way and a number fell in. Captain Leary of the police, rescued seven persons, who were taken to the nearest hotel, and took train for Albany. A hat was picked up from the river, but no person claims it. The steamer never stopped for a moment but proceeded on her journey.
