The Russian Government has just closed contracts with American mills for 425,000 tons of steel rails. This is the largest single order of steel rails ever placed in America, and probably in the world. It was said that the contract price was \$92 per ton, delivered in New York. The aggregate value of the contract is placed at \$22,000,000. The order was distributed among four steel companies. The Cambria will make 150,000 tons; the U.S. Steel Corporation, 150,000 tons; the Lackawanna Steel Co., 75,000 tons; and the Bethlehem, 50,000 tons.

While no definite announcement has been made, it is understood that the Ontario License Commissioners will not allow manufacturers of wines in the Province to establish depots for delivery purposes. Some time ago a deputation of the manufacturers appeared before the Commissioners and asked if they could establish stores so that orders could be taken and filled from them. The Board has reached the conclusion that the Government did not intend, when drafting the Temperance Act, to allow the sale of wine from anywhere but the premises on which it was manufactured. The Board also intends to prohibit railway companies operating a bar service on trains through the Province after 16th September. The Commissioners have under consideration various regulations in connection with the sale of grape wine by Ontario manufacturers.

A very quiet but pretty wedding took place at the home of Mrs. R. H. Cotter, Ingersoll, at 2:30 p.m. on Tuesday, when their only daughter, Nora E., became the bride of Mr. Garfield E. Hessemauer, accountant of the Royal Bank, Aylmer. The ceremony was performed at the English Church, by the rector, Rev. Mr. Perkins, in the presence of only the immediate relatives of the contracting parties, among whom were Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Speirn, Miss O. Hessemauer, of the Royal Bank, Rodney; and Mr. and Mrs. T. P. Allan, London. After the ceremony, the happy party returned to the home of Mrs. Cotter, where a light luncheon was served. The honeymoon will be spent in New York City and Atlantic City, after which Mr. and Mrs. Hessemauer will make their home in Aylmer.
