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Negro Is Not Inferior

Columbia, Mo., Feb.—“The Negro
is a repressed element in our soci-
ety,” said Herbert Blumer, instruc-
tor in sociology in the University of
Missouri.

“We segregate him in theatres,
street cars and everywhere. There
is no opportunity for him to partic-
ipate in cultural things. He is re-
pressed politically, educationally, in-
dustrially and socially.”

Mr. Blumer then went on to tell
some of the many ways in which the
Negro is repressed. He said that
in some parts of the South only \$2
was spent on the education of the
Negro as compared to \$10 spent on
whites. He said that in politics the
Negro did not have chance and point-
ed out the fact that there was not
a single Negro senator or congress-
man and not a single Negro repre-
sentative in states where the outnum-
bered the whites.

“There is no proof that the Negro
is inferior. This has been proved
by the reports of anthropologists
and others. The white race is the
most hybrid race in the world to-
day? I can see negroid blood through
characteristics of this audience. The
Negro invaded Southern Turope and
mixed with the native stock. There-
fore many of the nations of Europe
show negroid blood. Many people
think that the Negro race in Africa
had no culture, but the belief is ab-
solutely absurd because he has en-
joyed high civilization,” said Mr.
Blumer.

Mr. Blumer also brought out the
important part the Negro played in
the World War and also the Revolu-
tionary War and the War of 1812.

“The reason for racial trouble to-
day is that the whites will not accept
the fact that the Negro is capable
of doing as much as the whites,” said
Mr. Blumer.
