Panic in Notre Dame.

A Crazy Parisian Fires Four Shots
in Church.

The Queen Was Pleased.
LONDON, April 24.—The Queen was very
much pleased with her stay in Florence,
and her health and spirits have both been
much benefited.

British Parliament.
LONDON, April 24.—The House of Com-
mons resumed consideration of the budget
this evening, and approved the Govern-
ment's proposition to reorganize the death
duties by consolidating the probate ac-
count, estate, legacy and succession duties
into one class, to be called the estate duty.

Panic in a Parisian Church.
PARIS, April 24.—The congregation of
the Church of Notre Dame were panic-
stricken last night by the firing of four
shots from a revolver during the services.

Army Inefficiency.
LONDON, April 24.—Capt. Norton has
done well to call the attention of Parlia-
ment to maladministration in the army
service, and something will have to be
done to amend the present system, which
is undermining efficiency and proving most
injurious to the service in every way. It
has long been a source of complaint among
army doctors that the director-general
was more or less a figurehead, and that all
matters relating to their personal comfort
and the distribution of stations were left
in the hands of civilian officials. The evil
has been intensified under the regime of
the present director-general.

Marine Disasters.
QUEENSTOWN, April 24.—The Norwe-
gian bark Saga, Capt. Rasmussen, has
drifted ashore at Castle Townsend. She
will probably be a total wreck. Her crew
have landed.

LONDON, April 24.—The British steamer
King Alfred, from Ferdinandina, before
reported ashore at Uist, has gone further
on the rocks. Her bottom is crushed to
within a yard of her "tween-deck."

A large vessel, bottom up, is reported as
being sighted April 19.

London's Latest Police Sensation.
LONDON, April 24.—The arraignment of
the Anarchists Francis Poli and Emile
Carnot (otherwise Giuseppe Ferrar) in the
Bow street police court to-day was attended
with a great deal of excitement. The police
had been informed that an attempt would
be made to kill Poli while he was en route
to court, and unusual precautions were
taken. The proceedings in court included
the readings of letters and documents in
Poli's handwriting, disclosing his inten-
tion to cause a dynamite explosion on May
16. These documents showed that Poli
had expected to meet his death on that
occasion, and letters of farewell, which he
had addressed to his parents and others,
were also read.

Whacking at the Lords.
LONDON, April 24.—Henry Labouchere
yesterday introduced in the House of
Commons a bill providing that if a measure
is passed by the House of Commons and
sent to the House of Lords, and is not
returned to the House of Commons within
two months from the time it was passed by
the House of Commons, then it shall become
law, the same as though the House of
Lords had acted upon it. The bill also
provides that the House of Commons shall
have it in its power to finally decree
whether amendments made to bills by the
House of Lords shall be accepted.

Rosebery and Matrimony.
LONDON, April 24.—To speculations
about Rosebery's Ladas winning the Derby
is now being added a great deal of gossip
about the Premier's marriage intentions.
I reported at the time of his accession a
statement made by a gentleman living near
Claremont, the residence of the Duchess of
Albany, that it is a matter of notoriety
in that household and neighborhood that
the courtship between the two has been
in progress for a long time. Others who
are in a position to know something of
what goes on say that the Queen refused
her consent to this marriage.

Labor Troubles.

Buffalo Begins to Feel the Force of
the Miners' Strike.

Soft Coal Prices Go Up and Lake
Traffic May Suffer.

Northern Railway Strikers' Committee
Decide Against Arbitration.

BUFFALO, N. Y., April 24.—The first
result of the great strike among the soft
coal miners was felt in Buffalo yesterday,
when the price on the dock advanced to
\$2.75 per ton. The strike he continued
it will completely cripple the lake steam-
ers, as the supply on hand is quite
exhausted within two weeks.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., April 24.—The
committee of the Great Northern Railroad
strike has decided against arbitration, and
President Hill, to lay before him a schedule
of wages demanded by the men.

CHICAGO, April 24.—The 4,000 employes
of the Pullman Palace Car Company at
Reduction in wages is assigned.

CONNELLSVILLE, Pa., April 24.—The men
at a dozen or more coke plants have downed
their tools this morning, causing a com-
plete shut-down, while at two-thirds of the
remaining plants part of the men came out,
and the remainder will join them in a day
or two.

BRAZIL, Ind., April 24.—The refusal
of the bituminous coal miners to join the big
strike caused a clash today between them
and the block miners, who have joined the
strike. Many were injured.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 24.—Secretary P.
A. McBride reports the miners of Northern
Ohio as firm in favor of the strike. He

UNIONTOWN, Pa., April 24.—The first
break in the ranks of the operators came to-
night when the Atlas Coke Company signed
the scale as demanded by the strikers.
One hundred and fifty men will go to work
tomorrow morning.

REDUCED TO ASHES.
GEORGETOWN, Que., April 24.—The busi-
ness portion of Fitch Bay was destroyed by
fire early this morning. It commenced at
the rear of E. B. Dold's sash and door
factory, consuming the entire building and
contents. The flames then crossed the
street to a row of shops occupied by John
Carr, L. H. Rand (undertaker), John
Gartyn and Horace Carr, which were all
destroyed with their contents. Dold's
other losses not estimated yet.

BRIGHTON, Ont., April 24.—Sunday morn-
ing one of Wm. Wade's large fruit houses
situated near the G. T. R. station was
burned. It contained over 100 bales of
hops. On the east side the old Occidental
Hotel, unoccupied, was burned.

KEENE, Ont., April 24.—J. Humphrie &
Sons, a large and oatmeal mill, with contents,
also their stable and workshop at Lang,
were entirely destroyed by fire last night.
Loss about \$3,000.

SUNDAY SCHOOL TRAINING.

The Deanery of Middlesex Sunday
School Association in Session.

Papers on the Training of Children in
Sunday School, with Practical
Illustrations by Teachers—
Peter Rijnhart on
Missions.

The Sunday School Association of the
Deanery of Middlesex held a regular
quarterly meeting in St. Matthew's Church,
East London, yesterday afternoon and
evening. The president, Rev. Canon Smith,
occupied the chair, and there were as-
sociated with him on the platform Mr. C. H.
Armitage, vice-president, and Rev. W. M.
Sage, clerical secretary, recorded the
minutes of the afternoon session, and Mr.
J. Nicholson, lay secretary, the evening
session. The meeting was opened with
singing and prayer by the rector.

After routine business the Rev. A. Cor-
bett, of Thorndale, read an able paper on
"The Successful Management of the Sunday
School," dealing with the proper division of
the school into primary, junior and senior,
and the classification of scholars; the best
way of opening and closing, and the neces-
sity for promptness and kindness combined
with firmness, both in superintendent and
teacher. He objected to leaflets as being
too fragmentary and too profuse, and be-
cause of their tendency to displace the
Bible. He urged upon teachers the use of
illustrations in teaching and keeping to the
old rule—"Question it into them and then
question it out of them." He recommended
annual examinations for pupils, and that
reports of the standing of the school be
sent to parents and also to other schools in
the deanery. The paper closed with an
exhortation to teachers not to be weary in
well doing. Discussion followed on the
several points, in which a large number
took part, including Rev. A. G. Smith, of
Munsey; Rev. T. H. Brown, of Delaware;
Rev. Mr. Sage, Miss Gower, Messrs.
Harrison, Hannah and Armitage.

After singing a hymn Mr. Alfred S.
Hannah, of the Memorial Church, gave a
model lesson to a class of juniors. Nearly
30 bright little fellows, being about half of
his class, were arranged before him, and
answered promptly to his many questions on
the lesson. It was evident that Mr. Han-
nah has the hearty good-will of his class,
and his method of teaching was highly com-
mended, and furnished many useful hints
to his fellow-teachers. After friendly dis-
cussion a hymn was sung, during which the
little ones retired.

Mr. Peter Rijnhart then gave a pointed
address on missionary work in Tibet, and
with characteristic earnestness urged the
duty of carrying the Gospel to them, illus-
trating his subject with pictures of wor-
shippers of Buddha.

Recess then took place from 6 to 7:30
o'clock, during which an excellent tea was
partaken of by those remaining to the
evening session. A large number availed
themselves of the kind provision made for
their refreshment by the ladies of St.
Matthew's.

THE EVENING SESSION.
The evening session was opened with de-
votional exercises, led by Rev. A. G. Smith,
after which Mr. Walter Crawford, of St.
Paul's Church, read an excellent paper on
"The Relative Importance of the Sunday
School Teacher to Foreign Missions." The paper
dwelt upon the proper qualification of the
teacher and showed the duty of such to
urge the importance of missionary work
upon their scholars, giving many refer-
ences to Scripture and the prayer book in
support of his arguments, and also urging
its importance on the ground of its hasten-
ing the second coming of Christ. An ani-
mated discussion followed on the best
means of accomplishing so desirable an end.

Mr. Cyril Anderson, of Christ Church,
then gave a model lesson to a class of church
from the audience, in which he showed his
method of imparting instruction to a class.
The reader replies showed the interest
excited in the minds of the class, and also
their clear grasp of the subject so graphi-
cally set before them. Like Mr. Hannah
in the afternoon session, he showed that the
Old Testament lessons were intended to
lead children to Christ. There was no
further time for discussion, but there were
many favorable comments upon the plan
adopted.

Mr. James Nicholson followed with an ad-
mirable paper on "Children's Services," in
which he gave an interesting account of
such services held in Liverpool, England,
giving the method of conducting them and
showing the many advantages to be derived
therefrom. It was resolved, on motion of
the subject until the next meeting.

The treasurer, Miss McDonald, read her
report, showing a small balance on hand.
A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to
those who had taken part, and on motion
of Mrs. Anstie the thanks of the associa-
tion were tendered to the ladies of St. Matthew's
for their kind and generous entertainment.

The selection of a place for holding the
next meeting was left in the hands of the
committee, it being understood that some
place contiguous to, but outside the city,
should be chosen.

The questioner elicited a number of
questions, most of which were answered by
the vice-president to the satisfaction of all
present. The meeting closed with singing
a hymn led by the excellent choir of the
church, with Miss Tibbs as organist, who
kindly played at both sessions. The rector
gave the benediction at 10:15 p.m.
