SIX KILLED.

Warsaw, Ind., Sept. 10.—There was a frightful accident Tuesday afternoon to a coaching party of young people which started out from Warsaw, Ind. When about five miles north of that city the horse took fright. They backed the wheels of the tally-ho over an embankment, and the people, horses and vehicle were rolled down a hillside in a mangled mass. Six persons were killed and four injured. Those killed are: May McNeill, broken ribs; Frank Donohue, driver, internal ribs injured; Victor Brice, leg broken. THE MANITOBA WHEAT CROP.

Winnipeg, Sept. 10.—The Nor-West editorially says: "The thrasher, which, after all, is the only reliable authority on the Manitoba wheat crop, is causing more or less disappointment in various portions of the Province. The yield to the acre develops less than was hoped and believed would be realized a few weeks ago, and the general belief now is that the figures named by the Nor-West, 20,000,000 bushels, as probable yield of Manitoba, will not be reached. The harvest, however, is not a bad one; the grade will average about that of last year, and the quantity, while possibly less than 20,000,000, will still be a good crop."
