Jottings From Glamas, Bruce County. The progress of this part of Ontario during the past 40 years is wonderful. Previous to that time nothing but a dense forest of settlers, were scattered over the whole peninsula. Now every acre is owned, settled and tilled for some useful purpose. Postoffices and villages are found every three or four miles apart, and as an evidence of success and indomitable perseverance we have cleared farms; commodious brick houses and evidences of prosperity are everywhere. The original settlers are leaving a heritage to their sons and daugh ters which no other county in the world can

The grasshoppers are playing havoc with the turnips and other green crops. Cattle are suffering, the grass being bare and dry, and have to be fed extra on many farms. Last week large shipments of cattle were forwarded from this district to the Toronto cattle market, and from there to Liverpool. Prices realized were very low indeed, 31c to 4c per pound for live weight, one shipper making only the same price as he paid,

after keeping them over a year. H. Cargill, the Dominion member for South Bruce, is nearly a "Pullman" in miniature. He owns and operates a fine flour mill, saw mill, sash and door factory, employes several hundred hands all the year round, owns some 10,000 acres of swamp and bush land. Cargill village is nearly supported by his industry. He has built nice houses for his men which he thinks Gibbons' Toothache Gum is the best rents at a low rate, and a large hall for church services and public meetings. Cargill is a fine man socially and
