There were four or five carloads, and with these included, the receipts were over 100 carloads, including 1,600 hogs. 200 sheep and lambs, 50 calves and about 25 milch cows and springers.

The export cattle buying was active, but prices did not regain their old figures, the decline continuing to be about 1-4c per lb from what was being paid ten days or a week ago. Cables to dealers were firmer, but the heavy offerings tended to keep the prices down. Everything was sold before the close of the day. About the top figures touched was 5 1-4c per lb, paid for cattle, which would have readily brought 5 1-2c per lb a short time ago. The range was down to 4 3-4c per lb for good export cattle, oxen and bulls bringing from 3 1-2c to 4c per lb.
In butchers' cattle all on offer sold before the close of the day, but much of the poorer stuff was hard to sell. The market was barely steady at from 3c to 4 1-2c per lb, the latter for picked cattle. Local buyers were operating pretty freely, and there was a better demand from the outside. About 10 or 12 carloads of good butchers' cattle were taken for Montreal. There were several sales of common cattle as low as 3c per 1b.

In stockers and feeders trade was rather quiet, and not many offered. There are some light stockers wanted. All milch cows and springers offered soon sold, and there occurred very little change in the market. Prices ranged from \$25 to \$42 mostly, but as high as \$45 per head would be paid for extra

choice, newly-calved milch cows. Hogs showed continued weakness. Some sold as low as \$4 40 per cwt, weighed off the cars. About 20 carloads of long, lean hogs, which had been contracted for, were delivered today, and sold for \$4.75 per cwt. Thick, fat hogs sold for \$4 40 per cwt, weighed off cars, and stores were rather quiet at from \$4 40 to \$4 45 per cwt.

Not many sheep and lambs were in. A bunch of 15 spring lambs, 4 sheep and good calf sold for \$85.

THE MURDER TRIAL

Continuation of the Evidence in the **Hyams Case**

For the Defense-The Hyams Handled a Lot of Money-A Faithful Wife.

Toronto, May 21.-The defense in the Hyams case this afternoon called a number of witnesses to show the de fective and dangerous condition of the hoisting apparatus in the Hyams ware-

M. H. Romah, an engraver who came from Philadelphia to give evidence in the case, said that on the morning of the death of Willie Wells he had met Harry Hyams and Wells at the corner of Adelaide and Victoria streets at 8:35 o'clock. He walked with them to the warehouse, Wells going in, and then went back as far as the barber shop with Hyams, who went in to get shaved Mr. Osler put the witness through a searching examination, but failed to

break his testimony. Toronto, May 22.—At the Hyams murder trial this morning Mrs. Dallas Hyams was again present, and on entering the court room she went over to the prisoner's box, and putting her head beneath the rail kissed her husband. J. Neale, photographer, testified to having seen Dallas Hyams at 11 King street west about 9 o'clock on the morning of the death of young Wells.

R. Wescott, a barber, then employed at a barber shop on Jordan street, testified to having shaved Dallas Hyams and cut his hair on the morning of Jan. 16, 1893. Dallas took his chair at 8:20 o'clock and left about ten minutes after nine.

John R. Collins, a stencil maker, and Robert J. Jessamine, a tailor, also swore that about 9 o'clock they had seen Dallas Hyams at the office, 11 King street west. Wm. T. Murphy, money clerk in the

American Express office, showed records of his company's books, which proved that during the five years ending March, 1894, the Hyams' had received \$20,000 from New Orleans and New York. The receipts had all been

signed by Dallas or Harry.

Mr. Osler brought out the fact that all the money received before the death of Wells, except \$150, had been sent to Mrs. C. C. Hyams, the mother of the prisoners, and that the prisoners signed the receipts simply as her

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
