Joubert Killed On Thursday!

Reports From Two Sources That the Boer Commander Fell in Action.

Armored Train Found No Boers at Colenso.

Bombardment of Ladysmith Was Proceeding on Sunday.

Boers Call in Natives to Plow the Farms of Absent Burgers.

Russians and Italians Join the Transvaal Army—The Basutos Said To Be on the Warpath.

London, Nov. 16.—A dispatch received here today from Pietermaritzburg, dated Nov. 11, says it is rumored there that Gen. Piet Joubert, commander-in-chief of the Boer forces, has been killed in action.

THE REPORT REITERATED.
Durban, Sunday, Nov. 12.—It was rumored here today that Commandant Gen. Joubert, of the Boer forces, is dead.

The Times of Natal later published a telegram from Lorenzo Marquez saying that Gen. Joubert was killed in action on Thursday, Nov. 9.

NO BOERS AT COLENZO.
Eastport, Natal, Friday evening, Nov. 10.—The armored train has returned from another trip, on which Colenso was reached. No Boers were seen. On its way back the train picked up at Frere a native runner carrying a number of letters. He said that Ladysmith was bombarded on Thursday, Nov. 9, by six 40-pounders, one shot from which struck Illings' store. The British big naval guns were still silent when he left. Little damage was done by the Boer bombardment, and there were few casualties. The runner further said, that the Boers intend to visit Colenso in the morning.

BOMBARDMENT HEARD AT LADYS- SMITH ON SUNDAY.

Eastport, Natal, Sunday evening, Nov. 12.—It is reported on good authority that a large party of Boers traveled from Colenso to Chevelly, and then branched to the west in the direction of Ladysmith.

Another party of Boers is reported to have been called upon to plow the Tugela, wrecking the households. Guns were heard in the direction of Ladysmith early this morning.

NEWS FROM BOERDOM.

Cape Town, Friday, Nov. 10 (midnight).—A dispatch from Pretoria dated Thursday, Nov. 9, says the natives of the town by a series of trenches in echelon. Such a move had been anticipated for some time, and there had been sent out parties to worry the Boers incessantly by night attacks. The Boers were not likely to be interfered with. A great amount of looting has occurred in the territories, however, since the proclamation was issued.

RUSSIANS JOIN THE ENEMY.

A dispatch from Lorenzo Marquez says that 50 Russians and Italians in Johannesburg have volunteered for service at the front. There are still, according to this dispatch, 240 burgher reserves in Johannesburg.

Commander Von Dassel, of the German cruiser Condor, has been appointed military attaché to Gen. Buller.

CHAPLAIN MATTHEWS HEARD FROM AGAIN.

London, Nov. 16.—The Times' Durban correspondent, under date of Sunday, Nov. 12, says: Chaplain Matthews arrived here today. He testifies to the splendid defense of the Royal Irish Fusiliers and the Gloucester Regiment against an overwhelming force of Boers, who held positions on three sides of the British troops. Retirement on the fourth side was impossible, as the way was too precipitous. Surrender was the only alternative to annihilation, as the Boers were on the point of opening a shell fire upon them. It was pathetic to hear the Fusiliers bemoaning their misfortune, several with tearful eyes saying: "Father, I would rather have been shot than this." The Boers have few tents, and are thought to be suffering severe privations. While in Pretoria Father Matthews understood that President Kruger was about to visit Natal, but the Boers declare that these are to bring the Ladysmith garrison to Pretoria.

WAITING FOR A VICTORY.

London, Nov. 15, 3 a.m.—It is now understood there will be no more news from the Transvaal until the British begin to win some real victories. There has been so much criticism of Gen. Buller and the Boers' newspaper correspondents for minimizing all the British losses and exaggerating those of the Boers that the government has

come to the conclusion that the public is better satisfied with nothing.

ONLY ONE STORY PASSED.
The only story allowed to pass the censor yesterday comes from Cape Town, where great excitement prevails over the report that Joubert threatened to kill six British officers if any harm is done to Nathan Marks, an alleged Transvaal spy, now in the hands of the British. Joubert, it is said, claims Marks is simply a criminal detective who was present in Natal on other business before the war.

Gen. Buller replies to this threat, which comes from Joubert through the Transvaal secretary of state, that the Transvaal should, upon declaring war, have withdrawn its detectives from Natal, and hence he is justified in holding Marks until a reasonable explanation of his presence in Natal is given. The final decision of the matter rests with Gen. White.

Gen. Buller wires to the Daily Mail under date of Oct. 31 that Mafeking is still holding out.

LEYDS REPLIES TO REDMOND.
Dr. Leyds, in a letter to John Redmond, denies the charge that the republic persecuted the Catholics, and that he would allow them to hold office. He says the laws make no distinctions, and gives the names of several Catholics now in office.

BASUTOS ON THE WARPATH.
Despatched from Ladysmith, dated Nov. 7, tell of a languid bombardment and a native rumor that the Basutos are on the warpath, which is supposed, according to one correspondent, to have had the effect of inducing some of the Orange Free State troops to abandon the siege and to return to their own territory, and also to be accountable for the slackness of the attempts on the Ladysmith defense.

Another correspondent says that in the attack upon the Free State forces at Dewdrop the Boers had 300 in killed and wounded.

BURGHERS WEARY OF THE WAR.
The reports that the Free State burghers are tired of the affair and are going home should prove true, the fact would be most important, as their retirement would probably compel Gen. Buller to withdraw northward. The statement
