SOL'S ECLIPSE

Furnished a Beautiful Spectacle at Fortress Monroe, Va., and Other Points.

New York, May 28.—Heavy clouds obscured the sky in New York and vicinity today and prevented anything but the most incomplete observations of the eclipse of the sun.

Fort Monroe, Va., May 28.—The sun was totally eclipsed at 3:53 o'clock in the afternoon. The period of totality was about 30 seconds, during which time a tiny star hung just below the magnificent corona which glowed around the inky disc.

Washington, D. C., May 28.—The eclipse was viewed here this morning without a cloud to mar the spectacle. Observations were made by scientists from the Smithsonian Institution at Washington, the English Astronomical Society of London, Yerkes Observatory, Princeton University, Charleston, S. C., Military Institute, and a representative from the Toronto Astronomical Society, was also at work.

The eclipse formed a beautiful sight, and the observers united in pronouncing the conditions perfect. Prof. Barnard, of Yerkes Observatory, stated that the totality period was slightly shorter than calculated, which proved the moon tables to be slightly incorrect.

London, May 28.—3:38 p.m.—The conditions in London for observations of the sun's eclipse were fair. The day was somewhat cloudy, but at 2:47 p.m. the sun shone out brightly and the circular shadow over the disc was remarkably clear out.

Washington, May 28.—The success attending the eclipse observations here was highly gratifying.
