It was in fact a year of unexampled prosperity, so that at its close he was about to make the most satisfactory financial statement that ever fell to the lot of a Canadian finance minister to make. expenditure for the fiscal year under consideration was \$9,742,187, so that, while providing for all this large expenditure, which included \$1,547,623 for South Africa and the Halifax garrison, he had been able to reduce the debt by \$779,639, the net debt standing on the 30th June, 1900, at \$265,493,806. There had been only reductions of the public debt twice before in Canada, namely, in 1871 and in 1882, when Sir Francis Hincks and Sir Leonard Tilley respectively were finance ministers. Turning next to the current year ending June 30, 1901, he found that our revenue up to the 10th March was \$34,942,177-an increase of \$1,227,693 over the corresponding date of last year. He did not expect any further increase in customs revenue, but there would be some in railways, postoffice and excise before the year closes. He therefore estimates that the total revenue for the current year would be \$52, 750,000, or an increase of \$1,720,000. The expenditure on consolidated fund, he estimated at \$46,400,000, so that the 30th June next he would be able to show another surplus amounting to \$6,350,000. (Cheers.) The capital expenditure, he estimated, would reach \$10,700,000. There would therefore be an addition to the public debt, which he hoped would not exceed \$1,800,000. In four years the Liberals had added an average of \$1,749,003 to the public debt, as against an average of \$6,563,-000 yearly in the 18 years preceding. With regard to the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1901, it was too soon, he said, to attempt a close estimate. Estimates had already been submitted to parliament for a total of \$50,398,823, including consolidated fund and capital. There were supplementary estimates yet to come, which would swell that sum considerably, and there were special expenditures likely to

asked to grant a BOUNTY ON BEET ROOT SUGAR. but the government did not believe they would be justified in granting bounties as yet. Last year the con-cession was made of making free of duty beet sugar machinery of a class not manufactured in Canada. It was proposed to remove the restriction and allow free entry to all classes of machinery used in the production of beet sugar. The Conservatives, he said, were against what they called a onesided preference. (Hear, hear.) So the only thing for them to do was to bring in a resolution to wipe it out.

The prospect of Great Britain impos-ing a preferential duty in favor of Canadian products was most remote. It was not possible in 1897, nor was it possible last year, when Lord Salisbury refused even to receive a deputation from the Congress of Chambers of Commerce, who only asked a royal commission to inquire into the subject of interimperial preferential trade, and Mr. Chamberlain, in reply to the deputation, said the scheme was impossible unless the colonies removed their tariff barriers. To prove this Mr. Fielding quoted from Mr. Mac-Farlane's report to the Ottawa board of trade. "We do not deny," he said, in conclusion, "that if you did get that preference in the English market it would probably be of some advantage to the Dominion of Canada; but we do say that it is a question for the imperial authorities rather than for us. If we could get that preference we are as willing to assist in availing ourselves of any advantage which might come to Canada through it as any of the honorable gentlemen opposite. The only difference between us is as to the possibility of getting it and the means of getting it. I do not believe, sir, that it can be obtained today. I do not believe, notwithstanding all that one reads in the telegrams from the other side, that we are likely to have a change of front immediately on the part of the imperial government on the trade question. Yet I would not speak of the future. (Hear, hear.) We live in a time of

I will not say that at no future time in the history of the empire, and in the early future, possibly, should this prehave stated in this house that this is a question which we are content to leave to the future. We have believed that the true policy of preferential trade was not to make demands on the imperial government, which we well know they could not afford to yield t, us. The true policy was to give to Great Britain this preference freely and openly, leaving the imperial government and parliament to adopt that trade policy which in their judgment was best adapted to the interests the Engilsh people, but this we say, that if this preference will my honorable friends opposite desire to obtain is ever to come, I beg them to accept my opinion, my assurance, which I give them in all sincerity, that they never will obtain it by methods they have employed, that they will never obtain it by demands on the English government which are obnoxious to the creat mass of the English pepole. I venture to say, as I have said before, that if the time ever comes when we are to receive that preference, we shall not receive it as a result of any huckstering or bar-gaining betweet England and her colonies, but as the result of the development of that imperial sentiment which may override questions of political economy, and in the creation and development of that imperial sentiment a large and important factor has been the British preferential tariff of the Canadian government. (Ministerial
