Lecal Legal.

Ontario Investment Association vs. F. B. Leys.—Action brought to recover \$500 and interest since September, 1881, at 6 percent, on calls on stock in the Ontario Investment Association. The defense was that the circumstances under which the acceptance was signed prevented the plaintiffs from being entitled to recover. The defense was that it had only been signed to accommodate the association through their president, Mr. Murray, and that as soon as the meeting to alter the bylaws was over that a power to retransfer was given to the president—that in effect the defendant hever was a stockholder, and if a stockholder only a trustee for the plaintiffs. The defense further claimed that the association at that time was weak and involved, and even if the acceptance had been made with the intention of becoming a stockholder it was the duty of the president to have disclosed the condition of its affairs. The judge held that Mr. Murray did not intend to transfer and Mr. Leys did not intend to transfer and Mr. Leys did not intend to accept the shares, and that the defendant never incurred any liability with reference thereto; that the company being embarrassed it was Mr. Murray's duty to have disclosed to Mr. Leys its condition if he intended to fasten on him a liability, but that it was clear he did not because they had not sent the defendant any notices or ever treated him as a stockholder.
