#### Sent to Foreign Ministers in Pekin--Suggestions as to Conduct of Affairs in China.

Pekin, Tuesday, April 30.-Field Marshal Von Waldersee, in the letter which he sent to the ministers today as the reply of the generals to the views of the ministers regarding the military questions discussed by the generals in conference, says:
A garrison of 6,000 men should be left

at Tien Tsin and the adjoining districts, Great Britain, France, Germany and Japan to contribute 1,400 men each, and Italy to contribute 400 men. To garrison Shang Hai Kwan, france, Russia, Great Britain and Germany are to contribute 300 men each, and Italy one company until the forts

are raised. So long as any forces occupy Chinese territory the foreign military com-manders must exercise the full authormanders must exercise the full author-ity of a civil administration, accord-ing to the principle established at The Hague in 1899. The Chinese may re-main in office, as in the case of Pao Ting Fu and, partly, Tien Tsin. Be-bides the 6,000 men in Tien Tsin dis-trict, warships, which must always be in the Pei Ho, will preserve communi-

To allow this administration to de-pend in any respect on the mandarins would be an utter impossibility. Friction would arise immediately which would lead to difficult conflicts, which will be better avoided.

# UNIVERSITY.

The Minister of Justice Made an LL. D.

Degrees Conferred at Yesterday's Circumstances Surrounding the Convocation Upon Graduates and Others.

Kingston, May 1.-This afternoon the annual commencement exercises of Queen's University were held. They were a great success. There were 62 graduates in all, divided thus: Bachelors of divinity, 5; testamurs in theology, 2; bachelors of science, 2; masters of art, 11, 2 being ladies; bachelors of arts, 42, of whom 13 were ladies. The

medallists in moderns, English and history were ladies. Among the degrees conferred was that of LL.D., bestowed on Hon. David Mills, Minister of Justice. There were many regrets that the state of public ess at Ottawa prevented this distinguished statesman from being present to receive the honor in person, but Principal Grant has a strong conviction that Dr. Mills will be prevailed upon to attend at one of the autumn convocations, and deliver the introductory lecture. There was great applause when the name of Hon. Mr. Mills was presented for the degree by the senate of the university, who unanimously chose him as a fitting native Canadian upon whom to confer the high honor. Prof. Shortt, in presenting Hon. David Mills' name, spoke as follows: Mr. Chancellor,—I have the honor, sir, on behalf of the senate of our university, to present to you for the degree of Doctor of Laws a distinguished Canadian citizen and statesman. I

refer to Hon. David Mills, Minister

of justice. The numerous and eminent services which Senator Mills has rendered to his country, both as a private citizen and in various public capacities, are too well known to yourself and to those present to require any detailed recital by me. Whether as a teacher himself, or as the inspector of the work of teachers, in his earlier years; as a lawyer, journalist and politician in middle life; or as a professor of constitutional and international law and a minister of justice in his later years, his work has been characterized by a spirit of conscientious thoroughness which has rendered it of permanent worth to the various national interests with which it has been connected. # DREADFUL WORK OF POISON !

Death of Charles White,

Whose Wife Has Been Committed Brantford Jail on Suspicion of Killing Her Husband.

Brantford, May 1.-At the hour of midnight Mrs. Josephine White was arrested, charged with feloniously wounding and killing her husband, the ate Charles White. The arrest was made immediately after the coroner's fore jury had brought in their verdict, which was "that the said Charles White came to his death from strychnine poisoning, which we suspect was administered by his wife." She begged affectingly that she might not be locked up, and said that she could get bonds in the morning.

"I cannot stay in the dark cell," she moaned, "please, please, do not put me there. Mr. Heyd, do not let them do it. Send for my brother; he will go my bail. My God! This is terrible! Mr. Heyd, tell them that it will be all

right."
Mr. Heyd essayed to calm the we man, but she continued her pleading.
P. C. Chapman explained that it would be impossible for him to allow her to go home; that it was his duty to arrest her. Finally, he took her arm, and gently led her into the jail. At the door leading to the jail she hes-itated, and again broke into a piercing wail of anguish. Then she entered the door, which closed behind her.

CAUSE OF THE ARREST. The late Charles White died very suddenly on Sunday, April 14. On that morning Mr. White, who was employed as a moulder in the Waterous Engine Works, was left alone in the house with his wife. He ate breakfast as usual, but shortly after 9 o'clock complained of dizziness and shortly afterwards was seized with convulsions. He suffered six or seven of these and passed away.

The suddenness of his death caused the coroner to investigate it. Six sittings of the jury were held, all in sec-

On Sunday next Bishop McEvay tarts on a confirmation tour, and he will be absent from London every Sunday until the end of July. By that time he will have compassed the task of visiting and administering confirmation in every parish of his diocese within two years, as well as attending to his other manifold duties. This is a task involving great labor and devotion to duty upon the part of this faithful and zealous ecclesiastic, for the diocese comprises 50 parishes and about 40 missions. Bishop McEvay's obedience to his own stern sense of duty is evi-denced not only in the indefatigable manner in which he himself labors for the advancement of his church, but in the fact that he expects his priests to be equally faithful and untiring in their

his high office is shown not only in his capacity for unwearying efforts, but in the substantial progress that has marked the affairs of the diocese since his assumption of the episcopal chair. In London the past two years have witnessed the establishment of the Mount St. Joseph Orphanage, the improve-ment of St. Peter's Cemetery, and the beginning of work at a new separate school in South London, while a new church in the East End will shortly be under way. In the outside portions of the diocese, four new parishes have been formed, five new priests' residences erected, a convent built at Chatham, several new churches erected, and sixteen new schools established. A number of new schools will also be built in the Huron district. Altogether, the Roman Catholics of Diocese of London are to be congratulated on the ability and devotion of their honored head.


