BOER OUTRAGES

London Times Says They Have Massacred Whole Villages of Natives.

London, Nov. 15.—In an article on the war in South Africa, the Times says today: "The Boers as far back as last May were guilty of murdering whole kraals of Kaffirs in order to destroy the traces of the movements of their own commandos. The British authorities at the time, for some reason not specified, prohibited any mention of these outrages."

A London cable says: There are rumors of favorable advances received by the war office from South Africa, but nothing definite.

The Standard, the Dutch newspaper which is the official mouthpiece of Dr. Kuyper, the Netherlands premier, insists that the administrative council of the Hague tribunal is unable to offer its good offices in connection with the Boer appeal for arbitration.

BOERS WEARY OF WAR.
An interview with an Austrian merchant, who has just returned from South Africa, is reported by the Vienna correspondent of the Times. The merchant believes the war will last another six months, but does not think the Boers will hold out beyond next June. He believes they would be glad to make peace if they obtained substantial autonomy. He says the British should not allow the burghers to retain gold mine regions, which should be permanently under British rule. This observer also declares that Kruger kept up the Afrikaner Bund by wealth derived from the gold industry. He says if Kruger loses his money he will soon lose his friends.

COAL MINE DISASTER

At Pocahontas, W. Va.—Five Dead Bodies Found—A Score Injured.

Bluefields, W. Va., Nov. 14.—Five dead bodies have been taken from the Baby mine at Pocahontas, W. Va. Several other persons are unaccounted for, and 25 persons have been rescued more or less severely injured.

At 3 o'clock this morning it was discovered that the Baby mine of the Pocahontas Colliery Company, at Pocahontas, W. Va., was on fire. An alarm was sent in and in a very short time the fire fighters had reached the mouth of the mine and were attempting to extinguish the flames.

Some of the firemen and others rushed inside to assist the miners entombed there, when a terrific explosion occurred, and many persons were injured.

Five bodies had been recovered up to 6 p.m., and it is uncertain how many more are dead, though it is known that there are possibly eight or ten men still in the mine. Twenty-five persons have been rescued, all more or less burned, some seriously and probably fatally. One or two other explosions followed that of the early morning. The mine is still burning.

The fan has now been stopped, and as soon as it is possible to do so the mine will be re-entered with the hope of extinguishing the fire.

THE PAN-AMERICAN

Cost the Company Nearly \$9,000,000—Shortage \$3,326,114.69.

Buffalo, Nov. 15.—The directors of the Pan-American Exposition Company and a number of creditors yesterday heard the financial report of the company, as prepared by the auditor. The report shows the total liabilities of the company at the present time to be \$3,326,114.69, assuming that the assets of \$14,844,15 are collectible at face, the total cost to the Exposition Company was \$8,890,757.20. The total receipts were \$17,479,979.20. After May 1 were \$2,467,066.58 and the receipts from concessions were \$3,011,522.73. The balance due to first mortgage bondholders is \$174,979, and to second mortgage bondholders \$500,000, both of which are included in the liabilities as given above.

LOST HIS ARM!

Glencoe Boy Badly Injured Through Jumping on a Moving Train.

Glencoe, Ont., Nov. 15.—About 4 o'clock yesterday, Charles, the 10-year-old son of John Clarke, lost his right arm while amusing himself by jumping on and off a shunting train. The boy caught a slowly-moving car, which started with a jerk, throwing him under the wheels and badly crushing his arm above the elbow. Although very weak from loss of blood, it is a peculiar coincidence that the boy's father, when young, lost his arm by being thrown under a moving train.

The Montreal Chamber of Commerce has adopted a resolution in favor of a preferential tariff between Great Britain and Canada.

L. J. Girouard, Canadian Government registrar in the Klondike, was shot and killed in Dawson on Monday, by a man named Lord.

John Hooper, whose body it was reported, was found in a well in Otsego township, is alive and well. The mystery has now assumed a more difficult aspect.

The Princess Sophie Dhuleep Singh has arrived in New York from Europe. Her father, the Maharajah of Lahore, was once owner of the famous Koh-i-Noor diamond.

A special from Rickfield, Sevier county, Utah, states that the damage to property in that county from the recent earthquake will amount to at least \$100,000. Scarcely a building escaped injury of some kind.

Thursday morning a trolley wire broke at the corner of Murray and Nelson streets, Brantford. A horse, driven by the American Wringer Company's agent, stepped on the fallen wire and was instantly killed.

The Smallpox.

Quebec, Nov. 15.—Smallpox still lingers in Montreal, notwithstanding that every precaution has been taken.

It is stated that out of existence, fifteen houses being isolated. The city health physician, Dr. Catellier, is in no way alarmed, but feels satisfied that the disease has lost its grip in Quebec city. Five thousand vaccine points have already been sold.

Toronto, Nov. 14.—Anxiety is still felt by the provincial health department as to the safety of the Penikesean settlement in view of the proximity of smallpox areas, and a couple of hospital tents have been sent there.

ROSENBERG AT CARBONDALE, ILL.
Carbondale, Ill., Nov. 15.—An officer from Windsor, Ont., has arrived here with Jacob Rosenberg, the Vienna, Ill., merchant, who mysteriously disappeared from his home in several months ago, and for whom the police authorities of Canadian and United States cities have been watching.
