COAL MINE DISASTER

Found-A Score Injured.

Bluefields, W. Va., Nov. 14-Five dead odies have been taken from the Baby mine at Pocahontas, W. Va. Several other persons are unaccounted for, and 25 persons have been rescued more or less everely burned.

At 3 o'clock this morning it was discovered that the Baby mine of the Pocahontas Colliery Company, at Pocahontas, W. Va., was on fire. An alarm was sent in and in a very short time the fire fighters had reached the mouth of the mine and were attempting to extinguish the flames.

Some of the firemen and others rushed nside to assist the miners entombed there, when a terrific explosion occurred, and many persons were injured.

Five bodies had been recovered up to p.m., and it is uncertain how many more are dead, though it is known that there are possibly eight or ten men still in the mine. Twenty-five persons have been rescued, all more or less burned, some seriously and probably fatally. One or two other explosions followed that of the early morning. The mine is still burning.

The fan has now been stopped, and as soon as it is possible to do so the mine will be re-entered with the hope of exinguishing the fire.
