

## HUGE CATACOMBS FOR NEW YORK

To Be Used for the Burial of Roman Catholic Priests.

FIRST IN AMERICAN HISTORY A Great Cavern Will Be Dug Fifty

Feet Deep in the Form of a Cross.

New York, Aug. 17.-Old world methods of laying away dead priests are to be introduced in New York by Archbishop Farley. The archbishop has just accepted plans for a huge cavern to be dug in Calvary cemetery, in which catacombs similar to design to the famous catacombs of Rome, will be built. The designs, however, call for a more elaborate cavern than those in Rome. Archbishop Farley got the idea a year ago, when he was in Rome, and, on contrasting the forlorn system of burying priests in this country with that of Rome, decided to lay his plans before A Sad Catastrophe Reported from the clergy.

Every clergyman in the archdioces approved of the idea and at once a sinking fund was organized. A cavern will be dug in the form of a cross, fifty feet deep. At all angles there will be divisions cut out of solid rock. 

WERE TOO SCARED TO ESCAPE

IN A RUNAWAY

Wheel Dropped Off of Vehicle and Screams of Inmates Caused the Horses to Bolt.

New York, Aug. 17.-The Raymond street jail "Black Maria" was completely wrecked after a mad career through four blocks near Court Square, Brooklyn. Eight prisoners, locked in the wagon, were shuffled about like dice, bruised, battered and finally rolled out in the street, and while they were rubbing their bruises the reserves of two stations searched frantically for them, finding them at last too fright-

The Black Maria was driven from the Raymond street jail to the court sessions, carrying eight prisoners, including Charles E. Rogers, accused of murder. After the prisoners were arraigned for pleading they were taken back to the vehicle and

Driver Joseph Evans whipped up the horses and the Maria proceeded swiftly along Myrtle avenue. When it reached Fulton street the left hind wheel came off and down went the rear of the heavy vihicle with a tercally sealed box. Their cries alarmed ward Court street.
