[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, April 15. - For the first time this session, the Legislature assembled at 2 p.m., instead of 3, the earlier hour having been selected in order to conclude the business of the session as expeditiously as possible.
It is expected that prorogation will take place at the end of next week. The division on the Soo bill is not expected to take place before Tuesday. The debate on the measure was continued in the House all day today. Mr. Hanna resumed the thread of ks interrupted
