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**MASONIC LODGE OF INSTRUCTION**  
WAS THE LARGEST IN A DECADE  
Members From All Parts of the District Attend Function in the Temple.

A lodge of instruction was held in the Masonic Temple yesterday, and it was the most largely attended district instruction meeting that has been held in the temple for a decade. 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Differences of opinion would be sure to arise, he said, but there was no reason for these differences resulting in ill-will toward one another. He asked all to drink to the toast of the city of London, and this was done by the company in a hearty manner.

**Schools' Economy.**  
Chairman Yeates of the board of education, replying to this toast, said the board this year were determined to run school matters on an economical basis as far as possible, but they did not feel like sacrificing the efficiency of London's schools—schools which are reputed all over Canada. Wages in all lines of business had gone up from 25 to 40 per cent in fifteen years, and it was only natural that school teachers' salaries should also be increased, and the board felt justified in making the increase. They had made some days ago what was the first advance in public school salaries in this city in fifteen years.

**To Safeguard City's Health.**  
Dr. Egdorf, chairman of the board of health, said he had known Mayor Campbell for many years as a capable and efficient public man, and he felt that bearing in mind the fact that the city would be sure to rebound to the public interest as the year rolls by, he would make every effort this year to safeguard the people's health by thoroughly inspecting all summer resorts frequented by Londoners. As regards the sewerage system, he said it was the idea of the board to not alone complete the sewage beds, but also to install a natural sewage system in the future. There will be no complaints regarding the pollution of the river by sewage.

**The Public Library.**  
Dr. A. O. Jeffery and Mr. George C. Libby, chairman of the Public Library board, Mr. Gunn agreed with the mayor as regards the paring of the estimates, as he felt that each of the civic bodies should do all in their power to keep down the taxes and the rate this year.

Mayor Commissioner Jones replied on behalf of the commission. He promised to use his best endeavors to keep down the estimates.

**"The Mayor's Cabinet."**  
Ald. Stovely then responded to the toast of the "Mayor's Cabinet," as the chairman of No. 1 committee. He said the day is not far distant when London will be the metropolis of the entire western section of Ontario. London is a deep debt to the men who have guided its destinies in the past. Though many people object to the tax rate in London is a fact that no money paid out brings such returns to the citizen as the taxes he pays. A man assessed for \$1,000 pays about \$2 a year taxes, and for this sum his children are educated, his home is provided, and he is given good streets and good walks. If London progresses in the future as in the past it will not be many years until the city has a population of 75,000.

Ald. Forriest, as chairman, replied on behalf of the board of works. He agreed that the council should be economical, but he did not think that this applied to the board of works. In previous years the board had too little to spend. There was an overdraft last year, and he has not heard the last of it. To his mind it does not matter how much money is spent on the streets if it is spent wisely. This year the streets must be put in repair, and the board must have money to do the work.
