POSED AS COUNT

**Strange Story From Italy That Cul-
minates in Tragedy.**

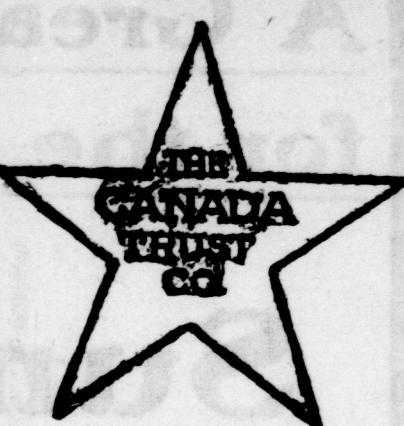
London, Aug. 10.—A strange story of
impersonation with a tragic sequel has
been running in the law courts of
Rome. Count Adriano Benicelli, an ex-
centric nobleman, charges his valet,
Anthonio Paolo, with having caused
the death of the Countess Benicelli.
Taking advantage of the extraordinary
resemblance between himself and
his valet, the count employed the valet
to impersonate him at various social
functions in Rome and elsewhere while
he himself devoted his time to his hobby
of collecting and repairing ancient
locks. Paolo, provided with money and
good clothes, mixed in the best society
and was everywhere received as the
count.
Meeting the Countess Benicelli at a
ball, the valet paid her assiduous at-
tention. The countess was pleased, but
greatly surprised at the valet's drive,
for whom she mistook Paolo, had neglected
her for some years, not living with her
or seeing her. A few days after the
supposed reconciliation the countess and
Paolo drove to Rimini. They were
walking toward some caves, to visit
which was the object of the drive,
when a peasant woman rushed up to
them and accused Paolo of deserting
her at the same time addressing op-
probrious insults to the countess. The
latter then discovered that she had
been deceived. When she saw the
woman countess kneeling in the street
at the feet of Paolo's wife, she asked
the woman's pardon and returned
to Rome alone on foot.
The same night she was found dead
in her mansion, poisoned by an over-
dose of laudanum. On her dressing-
table lay a letter stating that she had
believed Paolo to be her husband and
that what she had done had driven her
to suicide, as she was unwilling to
sully the spotless record of a noble
ancestry. The trial of Paolo has been
adjourned pending an inquiry into the
circumstances of the tragedy.

THE IRISH BANQUET CLOSED

A GREAT DAY AT THE PORT

**Sons of Erin Have a Nice Spread
and Listen to Speeches
and Songs.**

A great event to close a great day
was the banquet held by the Irish
Benevolent Society at the Fraser
House, Port Stanley, last evening.

Everyone knows that the annual ban-
quet of the I. B. S. at Port Stanley is
the jolliest, most informal, good-
natured, social affair of the year, and
last night's dinner was no exception to
the rule.

Unfortunately, there was an hour
and a half's delay in the preparation
of the dinner, so that the I. B. S. and
their 200 guests did not get seated until
9:30 o'clock. For this reason, the pro-
gramme of songs and speeches had to
be cut short. Many an Irish melody,
many a brilliant speech was thus lost.

However, the sumptuous fare, which
appeared with extra strength to men
who had been waiting for a good meal
and the general atmosphere of Irishman
good-nature which pervaded, made up for all
delays.

And such a feast it was. Half the
time the sound of knives and plates
was almost drowned by shouts of
laughter. Many a pause was made "be-
tween bites" while a joke or a good-
natured "jolly" was exchanged.

When all present had partaken to
their hearts' content, Chairman Phil
Pocock asked Secretary Wilson to read
a number of letters of regret from
gentlemen who had been invited, but
who had found it impossible to attend.
One and all, the writers expressed ex-
treme regret at not being able to be
present, all being conscious of the fact
that the Irishmen are the very cream
of hosts.

One of the most cordial of these let-
ters was from Hon. Charles S. Hyman,
who, regretting that business had kept
him away, and wished the I. B. S. and
their guests the very best of times.

Letters from Sir Wilfrid Laurier, R. L.
Jordan, Hon. Almon Beck, Hon. J. J.
Foy, Hon. J. W. Hanna, Sir John Car-
ling, and many others were also read.

Mr. Hyman's letter was as follows:
Ottawa, Aug. 4, 1905.
Dear Sir,—I am in receipt of the very
kind invitation of the president and
committee of the Irish Benevolent Society
of London, Ont., to their annual banquet
to be held at Port Stanley, on Thurs-
day, Aug. 10.

I assure you I regret very much be-
ing forced to deprive myself of the
pleasure of attending, but it is also
very necessary for me to be in Ottawa
on that date.

THE LATE MRS. IRELAND
Daughter of Westminister Pioneers—
Had Reached Age of 80.

One of the oldest residents of Dela-
ware Township, Mrs. Clementine Ire-
land, passed away Aug. 5, at the ripe
age of 80 years. Mrs. Ireland was the
daughter of the late William and Har-
riet Kilbourn Schram, who were among
the earliest pioneer settlers of West-
minister Township, having located on
a farm in the Gore (later occupied by
Samuel Tye, when it was mostly a
dense forest and where they reared a
family of eleven children. The de-
ceased was married to the late George
Ireland 55 years ago. They settled on
a farm on the fourth concession of
Delaware Township, and endured all
the hardships of early settlers' life, but
by years of patient industry and strict
economy, they made in time what was
an unbroken forest a fine and com-
fortable residence. Mrs. Ireland help-
ing her husband to perform the most
arduous duties on the farm. Her hus-
band predeceased her fifteen years ago.
She raised a family of eight children,
namely, Walter, John, Ferguson (De-
laware stage driver), Stillman, on the
homestead, and Mrs. Alton Ryckman,
all living in Delaware Township; Wil-
liam, a mason, living in Winnipeg,
Man.; Mrs. Walter Schram, of Mc-
Gillivray, and Harriet, living with her
mother on the homestead. Of her own
family six are yet living, her brothers
being Mr. Jeremiah and Edward
Schram, of Parkhill, Ont., of Wis-
consin; Horace and Robert, of Minne-
sota; and Mrs. Gleeson, an only sister,
in Bay City, Mich.

Mrs. Ireland, as well as usual the
act of retiring when death came
without a moment's warning. She had
suffered greatly with rheumatism for
a number of years. She was highly
respected by all who knew her, and
was always ready to help those in
trouble and in need of help.

The funeral, which was held on the
8th inst, was largely attended. The
funeral services were conducted by Rev.
Messrs. John Hooper, Henry Dead-
man, William Tye, James Burch,
George Tyler and Thomas Kennedy.
The services were conducted by Rev.
Mr. Fisher, of Delaware village, at the
house, and by Rev. Mr. Harris, of
Lambeth, at the church and grave.

in the family lot in Lambeth Ceme-
tery.
