JUST IN TIME

Doctor's Great Symp On Bike Saves Life of Child.

Syracuse, N. Y., May 18.—Driven almost frantic by the condition of his 3-year-old daughter, Jacob Hagenbuecher, who was about, he says, to operate upon his daughter's throat with a butcher knife, when a doctor arrived.

The little girl was suffering from diphtheria and the membrane was choking her. It was necessary that a tube be inserted in her throat at once to replace one that had become dislodged. Mr. Hagenbuecher tried to reach his family physician, but he was not at his office. The frantic father then called upon the physician, who a week before had saved the child's life by inserting the tube. This man likewise was not to be had. The child's life was hanging by a thread. The father called for another doctor, but he replied the work was out of his line.

After a few minutes, which seemed like hours to the father and mother, ready to save the dear one's life, the family physician arrived. But still there was delay. The case was one for a specialist. The physician sprang to the telephone and called upon a man experienced in such matters. He had left his office a few minutes before. Perhaps he was at home, said the person that answered. He was at home, at least two miles away. In fifteen minutes might be too late, was the admonition that rang in his ears as he sprang upon his bicycle. He thought that a human life was at stake, doubtless, and he was not to be deterred. He arrived in time. A new breathing tube was inserted, and the child's life was saved. When it was all over, it is said by Mr. Hagenbuecher, "I am glad to say that in his frenzy he was ready to cut a hole in the child's windpipe himself, to save it from strangling when the timely arrival of assistance averted the danger."

SLEIGHS MUST BE FOUR FEET WIDE ON CITY LINES

Radical Change Recommended by the Municipal Committee of the Legislature.

The members of the municipal committee of the Legislature had a difficult tangle to unravel yesterday morning, when they came to the discussion of Mr. Tucker's bill prohibiting the use of sleighs less than four feet in width in municipalities of less than 50,000 population after December, 1906. There was much difference of opinion on the subject, and several times the chairman was obliged to call the disputants to order. Finally a compromise was reached. It was decided to pass the bill, but leave it to the various county councils to say whether they would declare it operative within their limits.

The measure, it was pointed out by its supporters, aimed at the improvement of country roads in winter time by making wider tracks. It had been approved by the Good Roads Association. As explained, it did not apply to cutters nor light vehicles.

Against the bill it was argued that heavy expense to farmers and much inconvenience and probably loss to manufacturers would be involved in introducing such a change at so short a notice as one year.

Hon. W. J. Hanna contended that the fact that such legislation had been introduced was sufficient notice to the manufacturers that it would be carried in time, but that the committee should take no action at present.

Mr. Kidd, of Ontario, said that such legislation must come sooner or later and it might as well come now. The manufacturers had been given abundant opportunity to be heard, and they had not availed themselves of it.

Finally the compromise outlined above was carried.

The proceeds of the sale, which were considerable, will be devoted to the purpose of furnishing the rector's vestry room.

LEGAL VICTORY FOR THE UNIONS

The Master-in-Chambers Decides That Orders Cannot Be Sued as Such.

Toronto, May 18.—Another decision affecting the point of a union's liability to be sued was handed down by the Master-in-Chambers at Osgoode Hall this morning, when he granted a motion to set aside the service of a writ on David Campbell, of Toronto, third vice-president of the Order of Railway Telegraphers.

Mrs. John Wallace and Mrs. Matilda Vincent, beneficiaries of the late Isaac W. Vincent, of Renton, Ont., wished to sue the union for a \$500 benefit certificate held by deceased in the order.

The master, in setting aside the service of the writ, held the order was a voluntary association, unincorporated, and not a partnership. If plaintiffs sued, they must sue the representative officers of the order.

The writ issued makes the order the sole defendant, and it was served on David Campbell, of Toronto, third vice-president, and D. L. Shaw, of London, assistant secretary-treasurer. Such service the master holds cannot bind the order.

The judgment says in part: "The position of such unincorporated associations was considered in a suit against the Brotherhood of Trainmen, and the effect of the decision was that it was held that such bodies are exempt from the provisions of the acts relating to insurance. The question of the service of the writ was not dealt with in that case, but it would seem to follow from the recent decision in *Metallic Roofing Company vs. Local Union* that such bodies cannot be regarded as partnerships, nor used as such. They cannot be sued in their adopted name nor served with process merely by serving one of their members, no matter how exalted the position, or high sounding the title he bears."

The master further says that the provision in the benefit certificate that the application for payment must be made at the head office at St. Louis, may have the effect that no redress can be obtained in the courts of this Province.

The only way in which union members can be reached according to the decision in the *Metallic Roofing Company* case, is by suing representative members of it, and getting an order of the court that all members of the union are to be bound by the judgment against their representatives. The great objection to this method is that it is by no means certain whom the court will hold to be representative members, as there are decisions on the point, and a plaintiff is entirely at the mercy of the court in his action, not knowing whom to sue. The whole burden of the decision is on the plaintiff, and no doubt many are deterred from proceeding with actions owing to the difficulty and expense of serving scattered members, and the danger of having the judgment recovered reversed on appeal on the ground that the proper persons were not served with the writ, or made defendants.

Complaint of City Not Well Founded, Says Manager—Street Names Changed.

At the meeting of the board of works last night, a letter from Manager Carr, of the London Street Railway Company, was read, in which it was stated that the city's complaint that there are not enough cars on the city lines is not well founded. Mr. Carr showed by figures appended that there are ample cars to carry all the passengers who use the several lines. The real trouble is, Mr. Carr says, caused by so many cars and lines of cars being compelled to use the one line of track. In order to avoid this, it has been suggested that the piece of track on Horton street, between Richmond and Wellington, be doubled, the company to be allowed to consider this double track as additional mileage, and Mr. Carr agrees to bring the matter to the attention of the directors of his company at a meeting to be held on May 26.

The manager Mr. Carr, advised that the cars in operation on the lines now are ample for the accommodation of all passengers were of much interest. The first street line was 7; the Wellington street line, 4 1/2, and the South street line, 6 1/2. It is asked that the whole matter be laid over until after the meeting of the board of directors. The letter was sent to No. 1 committee.

The petition to have the name of South street changed was then taken up. It was moved that it be named Ottawa avenue. Finally, after the engineer had named several other streets whose names should be changed, the following names were decided upon:

South street, to Ottawa avenue. Shewbottom street, to Thornton avenue.

College street, to Hellmouth avenue. Cavendish street, to Barmston street. In regard to the latter change it was pointed out that Mr. W. H. Bartram, who is the heaviest taxpayer on the street, was the last reeve of Peterborough and the first reeve of West Gwillimburgh, and that he should be honored by having the street named after him.

The board heartily endorsed the recommendation of the engineer that the ward foremen henceforth exercise particular care to keep the macadam roadways in the best condition, by filling in all holes with crushed stone as soon as the holes make their appearance.

After the city solicitor's letter on the subject had been read, the committee filed the recommendation of the city engineer to use the asphaltum filler on King street.

The assessment commissioner reported that the following petitions are sufficiently signed, and the works will be advertised at once. For a cement walk on east Maitland street, South to Nelson; for a cement walk on north St. James street, Colborne to Wellington; for a cement walk on north St. James street, Alma to Wellington. The petition for an addition to the walks on the west side of King street, Ridout to Talbot, was found to be sufficiently signed, and it was filed. The petitions against a cement curb on St. Colborne street, between William and against a cement walk on east Gleebe street, King to Dundas, were signed sufficiently, and the work will not be proceeded with.

THE DOG NUISANCE AGAIN TO FORE

Lawns and Flower Beds in London and Elsewhere Are Suffering.

The dog nuisance always comes to the fore in the spring of the year, when people are busy improving their lawns and planting flowers, and just now very many citizens are in real pain and feathers on the warpath after dogs who have destroyed their lawns. In London 1,824 dogs were licensed last year, and it may be taken for granted that there are sufficient unlicensed curs in the city to bring the total dog population up to 2,500. This means a dog to about every eighteen persons in the city, and altogether a very considerable number of dogs, who, according to the opinions of those who love neat lawns and beautiful flowers, are a nuisance.

Toronto has an army of about 7,000 licensed dogs, but the unlicensed tag-along canines which fall into the dog catchers' net, or make their escape, are a much more serious nuisance. Information received by the license department in London to time the number of dogs in Toronto is large compared with other cities.

In Ottawa some success has been attained in doing away with the nuisance by the enforcing of the following bylaw:

"No person shall allow his or her dog to run at large in any of the public parks, squares, drives, lanes, alleys or public places in the city, unless such dog is accompanied and is under the immediate control of some competent person, and any dog running at large shall be liable to be captured and disposed of as hereinafter provided."

This means that any dog found alone in the streets, in any public place, at night or by day either may be captured by the police and disposed of. In Toronto, as in London, the only law which is operative permits the dogs to roam about alone at any hour of the day or night, provided they wear tags.

FIGHTING WHITE PLAGUE

Physicians Meet at U. S. Capital to Discuss Ways and Means.

Washington, D. C., May 18.—An attempt upon tuberculosis from every quarter constitutes a program for the day here today and to continue tomorrow, in which more than 200 of the leading physicians of the country are participating under the designation of the first annual meeting of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis.

Dr. Edward Trudeau, Dr. Wm. Osler and Dr. Hermann M. Briggs are the president and vice-presidents respectively of the association, and each addressed the general meeting today.

The afternoon session was conducted in two sections, the sociological and the clinical and climatological. In the first work of localities was reviewed with allusions to the necessity for participation by the public in contribution, etc., to save the lives of those afflicted with this disease. Pennsylvania, it was stated, the average cost of curing a tuberculosis patient was \$120. In New York the cost was estimated at from \$7 to \$8 a week, while in Maryland \$86 was given as the cost of cure. In comparison with this was stated that the value of lives saved, together with the most of attention and medicines in cases where no special treatment was secured, amounted to a total of \$2,000. The investment was said to return a dividend in favor of the organized effort as represented in the modern institutions.

The discussion in the sociological section was based on two papers, by Homer Folks, of New York, and Edward T. Devine, of New York. The discussion was general.

The second section took up the technically medical phase of the subject. Dr. Norman Bridge, of Los Angeles, presiding. It was stated that 12 per cent of the death benefits paid by one of the "Big Three" life insurance companies was due to tuberculosis; that over one-half of such beneficiaries were paid during the first five years of the life of the policies and that of the half billion dollars paid in death benefits by one of the large companies yearly \$5,000,000 is paid on account of this disease.
