The total assets amount now to nearly twelve million dollars, having gained since 1997, over \$400,000. The gross earnings and the net profits of 1908 both considerably exceed those of 1907, while the addition of \$70,000 to the Reserve makes that fund now over 90 per cent of the company's paid up

From a very large number of applications, mortgage loans of one and a half millions were made, and, in addition, municipal debentures and bonds to the amount of \$629,430 were purchased. The average rate of interest returned by these investments exceeds that of the recent years, while the margin of security available is quite as

The arrears on mortgages are substantially less than in 1907, and the company has no real estate on hand

The tide of immigration into the northwestern provinces, and the consequent settlement of large areas there convinced your directors the time had come when the company's loaning operations might safely be extended to the best districts.
