

NO DEBATE ON NORTH END LINE

Everybody Seems Satisfied to Allow Railway Board to Settle Matter.

COUNCIL MET LAST NIGHT

Agreement With London Electric Is Extended One Year—Sheet Asphalt for Carling Street.

The question of the north end extension was referred by the city council last evening to the Ontario municipal and railway board without a debate.

It was expected that there would be a field day when this matter was considered, but the decision of the finance committee to send the whole problem to the railway board for solution prevented anything of that nature.

There was no gallery at the meeting, and none of those interested were present, with the exception of Mr. A. J. Morgan, who came in late, and as soon as he saw what had taken place, left the building. All the citizens are satisfied with the decision of the committee so far as can be learned.

Another Matter.
The board will also be asked to settle another question, provided an agreement cannot be arrived at between the city and the Southwestern Traction Company.

Windsor avenue has been opened up to the right-of-way of the company and the board of works will attempt to come to some agreement with the company to cross their line. If satisfactory arrangements cannot be made the railway board will settle the question.

Pavements.
A sheet asphalt pavement will be laid on Carling street, between Talbot and Ridout streets.

Last night a bylaw was passed repealing the bylaw to lay an asphalt block pavement on that street.

On Thursday night the board of work will receive a petition, signed by a petition, signed by two-thirds and more of the property owners along that street, there is no doubt it will be passed without difficulty.

Ald. Stewart stated after the bylaw had been passed last night that some of the owners were agreeable to asphalt block, if there was not much difference in the cost.

"Why did they not say so before this," said Ald. Beattie. "First they wanted block, and now they want a sheet asphalt pavement. We will lay a sheet asphalt pavement, and that will settle it."

Street Lighting Agreement.
The agreement between the London Electric Company and the city was passed by the council last evening, and this somewhat vexed question has at last been settled.

The agreement presented by City Solicitor Meredith is merely a continuation of the old agreement, and runs for one year only.

When the bylaw was presented Ald. Beattie informed the council that the London Electric Company were satisfied with the present form of the agreement, and were prepared to sign it.

"Mr. Hunt saw it, and he is satisfied with it," he said. "They are perfectly willing to sign it at once."

The bylaw was passed without question.

Ald. Garratt, chairman of No. 3 committee, wanted to know if he would order the company's account to be paid.

"As soon as this agreement is signed, the accounts can be paid," said Mayor Stevely.

"Does that include the claim for interest," asked Ald. Moorhead.

"No, I do not think so," said Ald. Beattie. "It merely calls for the payment of the regular rate for lighting our streets."

DUFFERIN PARK CASE.
Toronto, Ont., June 14.—Officers and directors of the York Riding and Driving Club, which organization operates the Dufferin Park, were before Hon. Mr. Hanna, the provincial secretary, this morning, to show cause why the charter should not be cancelled.

Mr. H. H. Dewart, K. C. counsel for the club, obtained an adjournment of the hearing until tomorrow. Mr. Dewart was before the hon. minister's comments as to the origin of the inquiry. ANNUAL BANQUET HURON ALUMNI

Very Pleasant Event Last Night in the College.

A PITHY TOAST LIST

Which Brought Forth Some Excellent Speeches—Those Who Were Present.

The annual banquet of the alumni of Huron College was held last night at the college, and proved a most enjoyable affair. Graduates from all over the Province were present.

Rev. R. S. W. Howard, of Christ Church, who is president of the Alumni Association, was in the chair, and after those present had honored the toast to "The King," he proposed the toast of the evening, "Huron College."

In the absence of Rev. Principal Waller, who is in England, the resolution was made by Very Rev. Dean Craig, who presided over the banquet. The dean pointed out that at the recent V. P. examinations, Huron College had not only presented several candidates, but six of them were successful.

The institution, he said, should be proud of their showing, as many of the largest colleges in Canada had only presented two candidates, and a great many more at that.

During the past year, he said, four missions in the Diocese of Huron have been supplied by men from Huron College, and in addition a number of vacant parishes have been supplied at different times. Altogether the records showed that 222 services had been conducted during the year by Huron College men. This, he thought, was a record any college might be proud of.

In speaking of the support given the college the dean regretted that in more than 100 parishes no collection whatever had been taken up to aid the college work, and stated that the total collections in the diocese for that purpose had only reached \$750.

Rev. Mr. Carlisle.
Rev. Arthur Carlisle, pastor of Holy Trinity Church at Lucan, and a graduate of Huron College, was heard with interest when he proposed the toast, "The Relation of the Alumni to Huron College." He spoke of the splendid lot of men that have been sent forth to do church work by Huron College, and of the high standard they are setting wherever they are.

He showed how much they remembered in any way, not even by a medal, a prize, or a scholarship. He urged upon the new executive committee to take steps to that effect, and that the alumni be founded to commemorate the founder of Huron College.

The Alumni.
The Alumni and Their Relation to the World" was proposed by Rev. C. P. Curton, of Mitchell, who spoke particularly of the being done by Rev. Thomas Westgate, a Huron College graduate in the mission field of West Africa. Ven. Archdeacon Hill, of Huron College, was the oldest graduate of Huron College, responded to the toast in an able manner.

The last toast of the evening, "The Council of Huron College," was proposed by Rev. T. G. A. Wright, Sarnia, and was responded to by Rev. William Lowe, of St. Matthew's Church.

SMOKE NUISANCE WAS DISCUSSED

City Council Refused to Send Delegate to Syracuse to Attend the Convention.

MR. NUTTER WRITES

City Architect Does Not Relish the Way He Has Been Treated by the City Fathers.

There was a debate on the smoke nuisance in the council last evening, the only debate of the session. It was decided to call a meeting of the manufacturers of the city in the near future, when the matter will be taken up by No. 1 committee.

The oratorical outburst was stamped by the recommendation of No. 1 committee that the building was constructed in violation of the act of the Prevention of Smoke, meeting in Syracuse next week.

Ald. Cooper objected to sending any person to Syracuse, stating that it would be a waste of money, particularly in view of the fact that Ald. Ferguson had in his possession all the necessary information.

"Ald. Ferguson has been to Detroit, and he knows enough about it to frame a bylaw," said Ald. Cooper.

"I think one member of the council should go to Syracuse," said Ald. Ferguson. "It is a complicated matter, and a lot of valuable information can be obtained. Personally I cannot attend, but I think Ald. Stevenson should go, especially as he is a member of the board of health also."

Ald. Rose favored a smoke bylaw, but he did not think it necessary to send a man to Syracuse.

Situation in the East End.
Ald. Parsons said that property in the East End was depreciated at least 10 per cent owing to the smoke. It would be of great benefit to the citizens generally if such a bylaw were enforced. He favored sending a delegate.

Ald. Moorhead thought such legislation might hurt the city with manufacturers, and consequently he favored a meeting with them to talk the situation over.

Ald. Beattie drew attention to the fact that the smoke nuisance in London was a crying one, and as it would be useless. An agreement might be of use for a short time, but there was no possibility of enforcing it. A bylaw, however, could be passed, and then it would be possible to deal with the railway companies.

Ald. Gerry was in favor of getting the manufacturers together. He did not think it right to send a representative to Syracuse.

When the motion to send Ald. Stevenson to Syracuse came to a vote it was a tie.

"If the council do not see fit to send a man to that convention I will not sanction it," said Ald. Beattie. "The motion was lost."

Wilson-Pratt Dispute.
An echo of the Wilson-Pratt dispute was heard in the council last evening. Ald. Beattie read the report of the special committee on the charges made against the building inspector by Mr. W. A. Wilson.

A communication was received from City Architect Nutter, in which he objected to the finding of the committee, especially as it dealt with his inspection of the building in question.

"I am sorry that Mr. Nutter wrote that letter to this council," said Ald. Beattie. "We cannot do anything about it, but we are letting him down easy. We thought that for his own protection, knowing the circumstances, that he would take every precaution to protect himself and the city in the controversy. We certainly did not say, as he charges, that he was to visit the building two or three times a week."

JUVENILE COURTS.
Buffalo, N. Y., June 14.—Children, lawbreakers, families and neighbors, husbands, immigrants and state supervision, and administration, were the topics scheduled for discussion at today's session of the conference of charities and correction.

Frank E. Wade, member of the state probation commission of Buffalo, was the first speaker in the section devoted to lawbreakers. He claimed that most of the offences of children are due to the faults of parents, and that the child problem can never be solved until corrective influences are also applied to parents.

Mr. Wade would give the juvenile courts exclusive jurisdiction in all cases in which children or parents who are wicked and delinquent in their children are concerned.
