BRAKEMAN AVERTS WRECK

G. T. R. Employee Hurlis Lantern Through Cab Window of Engine.

Owasco, Mich., Dec. 29.—It was learned Wednesday that the presence of mind of a Grand Trunk Railroad brakeman probably averted a crash similar to the one which occurred at Durand Aug. 24, in which ten lives were lost. The same conditions obtained Christmas night as on the night of the wreck, even the engine of No. 14 suffering a breakdown near the same spot. The brakeman who was sent back placed his torpedo and then hurled his lantern through the cab window of No. 14, as it speeded by at a 50-mile-an-hour rate. The second section was soon brought under control.

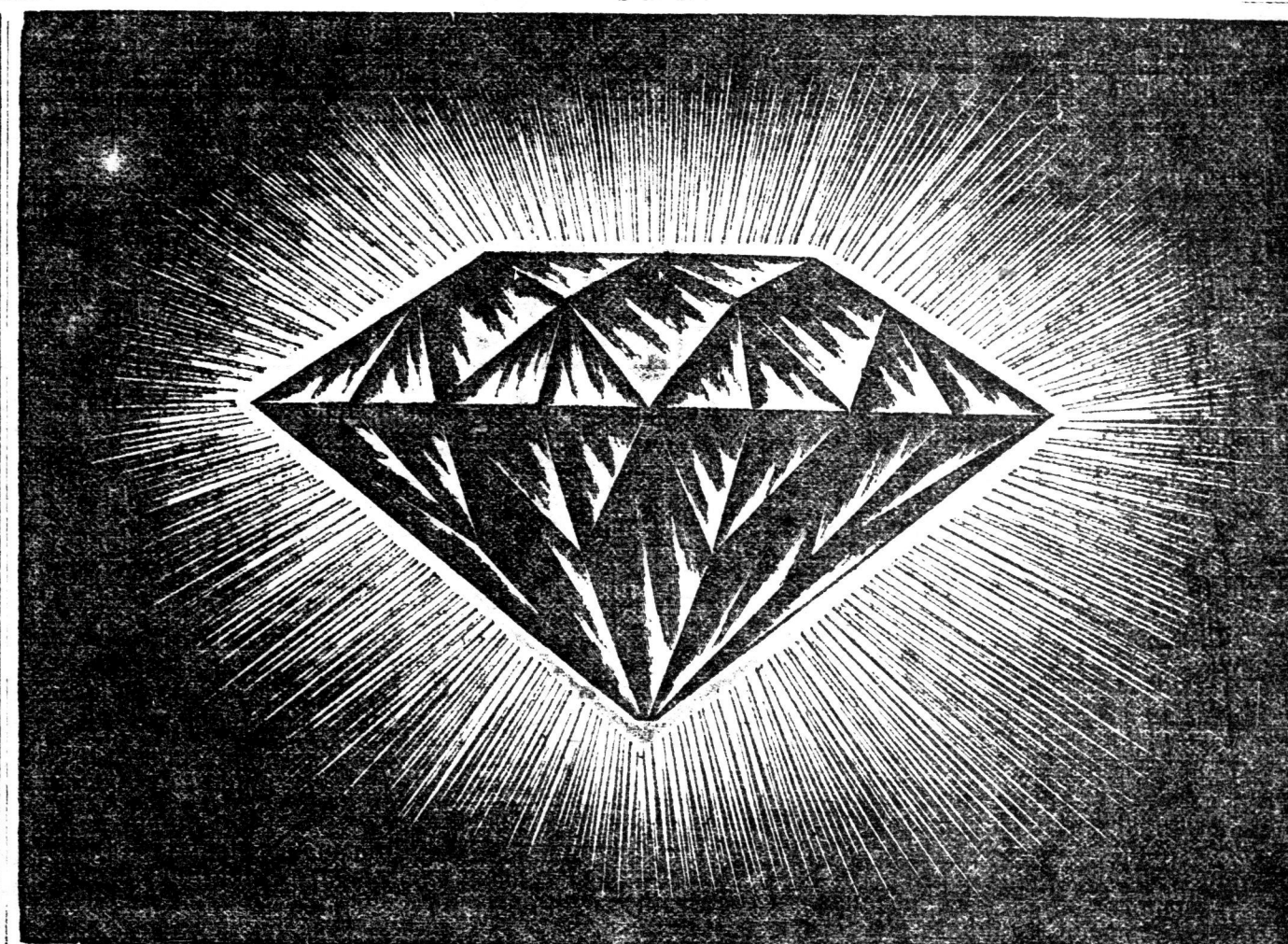

POLITICAL TANGLE IN TILBURY WEST

Some of the Nominees May Be Disqualified Because of Mistake.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Windsor, Dec. 29.—Nominations for the municipal elections throughout Essex County have resulted in a curious political mix-up in the Township of Tilbury West, details of which became known yesterday when some of the township officials came to Windsor to seek legal advice on it.
The township election will be held at the usual time, next Monday, and the names of four candidates for reeve and

nine for the township's council will appear on the ballot, but it is possible that every one of the candidates may be disqualified on the ground of improper nomination.

The statutes require that nominations be made in writing, with the signatures of the proposer and seconder for each candidate, but although this has been the law for years, it has never been observed in Tilbury West, the custom being to take verbal nominations instead.

When nominations for the approaching elections closed the township clerk found that he had no seconder for Duncan McAlister, the present reeve of the township, and it was accordingly held that McAlister had not been properly nominated.

The statutes provide for every possible emergency except the one that has arisen, but it is considered probable that if any attempt at disqualification is made it will be necessary to hold a new election.

HEIR TO \$200,000.
Washington, Dec. 28.—Though Frank Healy, for 17 years an inmate of the Government hospital for the insane, is sole heir to an estate worth nearly \$200,000 left him by his brother, Jas. A. Healy, a druggist, who died Sunday, he may never be able to use any of it.

The probate court was advised today of Healy's incompetency to manage the estate and a committee of administrators was appointed. The court was informed that when the news of his brother's death was imparted to him he neither responded nor gave any sign of understanding what was being told him.

At the death of the present heir the estate will be given to the nearest relatives of the dead druggist, who are cousins.
