Annual Meeting of St. John's Ambulance Association Held in Toronto.

(Canadian Press.)

Toronto, Nov. 28.—Unusual interest was given to the annual meeting of the Canadian branch of the St. John's Ambulance Association today by the presence of the Duke of Connaught, grand prior of the Knights of St. John. The ambulance association is an activity springing from the order, and now works in all parts of the empire.

The Duke of Connaught made a short address, in which he hoped the work was gaining the sympathy of the people of Canada. It was especially needed in a large country, where accidents were bound to occur frequently at some distance from a place where medical assistance could be secured.

Then it was that first aid proved valuable. It could be readily learned by application and sympathy, and everybody, especially policemen, firemen and railwaymen, should take the course. The Duchess of Connaught had taken a great deal of interest in the movement, and held five certificates for proficiency in giving first aid.

The annual report showed that the work had been taken up in many of the Work among the numerous institutions, so that the twelve months had been the most vigorous in the history of the association in Canada.

Work among the cities had been extended, and now practically all the members of the police force of Toronto, London, Hamilton and Berlin were wearing the badge of the association.

The following officers were elected for the coming year:—

President—Col. James Mason, Toronto.

Vice-Presidents—Lieut.-Col. W. M. Gartshore, London, and Hon. Wallace Nesbitt, K. C., Toronto.

Honorary Secretary—Treasurer—Charles J. Copp, M. D., C. M., Toronto.

ORDERED SOUTH

Premier Scott, of Saskatchewan, to Leave Regina for the Winter.

Santiago, Cuba, Nov. 28.—Two further orders of reinforcement to the garrison at Kiao-Chau from Hamburg has advised him to leave Regina before the cold weather sets in, and to remain away until spring.

FORCE FOR PEKIN

Berlin, Nov. 28.—The German Government has ordered a reinforcement of the force stationed at Kiao-Chau, to proceed to Tien Tsin for eventual use in Peikín. The war office is dispatching 200 men as a reinforcement to the garrison at Kiao-Chau from Hamburg on November 30. The same steamer of reinforcements is to be used to transport those belonging to the field battery stationed in the protectorate of Kiao-Chau, whose time has expired, but the old detachment will be retained if it is considered necessary.

WHY GOVT. SHIFTED THE SEA LORDS

Necessary to Have the Entire Admiralty Board Made of New Men.

IN SERVICE'S INTERESTS

Tells the Commons That the Change Is Not a Reflection on the Retiring Members.

(Canadian Press.)

London, Nov. 28.—(Through Reuters' agency.) Before the House of Commons adjourned tonight, Lord Alexander Thynne, Conservative member for Bath, asked as to the resignation of the three sea lords, and what reason there was for a change unprecedented in the history of the admiralty.

Right Hon. Winston Churchill, secretary of the navy, replied that two of the sea lords were to retire early next year. He said:

"I was confronted with the resignation of half the board, including its most important member, at a period when the Commons was discussing the estimates, and when much of its most important work was in full transaction. At the present time the issues are risen, and decisions will have to be taken governing admiralty policy and finance during the next two years. Having regard to the resignation of the three sea lords at the beginning of the year, I decided, after careful consideration and discussion with Premier Asquith and my colleagues, that it was better in the interests of the public service and of the navy, that the changes should occur now and give the retiring men a free hand to decide issues which otherwise would have been stereotyped, and over which they would have little effective control. The difference of any kind, personal or public, had arisen. No question of policy had arisen."

The New Lords.

Mr. Churchill, in paying a tribute to the retiring members, mentioned Captain Wm. C. Pakenham as an officer of rare distinction, he having been on Admiral Togo's flagship throughout the Russo-Japanese war, and present at the battle of Tsushima. He thought the appointments would be of the highest quality, and that the difference of any kind, personal or public, had arisen. No question of policy had arisen.

"Changes which slightly anticipated the regular and normal working of the admiralty, and which would not imply any slur or reproach upon any member of the outgoing board," continued Mr. Churchill. DR. REAUME DEFINES WHITNEY'S VIEWS

Says He Favors Bilingual Schools to Some Extent—Foy's Opinion Personal.

Ottawa, Nov. 28.—(Bilingual schools should not be an issue in the present election, but they have been made one, I find that the biggest opposition to these schools is in places where they have never and consequently know nothing about them."

The foregoing statement was made this morning by Hon. Dr. Reaume, of Sir James Whitney's cabinet, who is here on a departmental business. Dr. Reaume will go tonight to Prescott, where he will speak in the interests of Mr. George Pirand, M. L. A.

"What about that statement of Hon. Mr. Foy's that bilingual schools, as such, were illegal and would have to be abolished?" Dr. Reaume was asked. "That was made on Mr. Foy's own book, and was an expression of his personal opinion on the subject. You know I find that the biggest opposition to bilingual schools is where people haven't got them and consequently don't know much about them. However, the Government has taken a stand. Sir James Whitney's attitude is that while English should be made the language of the schools as far as practicable, and while it is maintained that every child should receive an English education, we are not against the French-Canadian and German having their children started in their mother tongue as a means to an end, and having their mother tongue taught in the schools as a subject when so desired by the trustees representing the people of the school section."

POLICE SEEK BOY

Eleven-Year-Old Chicago Lad Wanted on Charge of Murder.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 28.—Every policeman in Chicago is today on the lookout for Emil Zurnueheln, 11 years old. The lad is fugitive, wanted on a charge of murder.

On his way to school yesterday Emil met Richard Schapanski, a playmate, four years his junior. The two stopped and talked. Emil's father was the owner of a new revolver, and Emil invited his chum to come and see it.

The boys went to Emil's house. The details of what happened after that the police have been unable to learn, but the outcome was that the revolver was discharged, and the Schapanski boy instantly killed. Emil disappeared immediately afterward, and no trace of him has been found.

WANT CEMENT PROBE.

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 28.—That the alleged cement merger must be investigated was the sentiment of the Winnipeg Board of Trade last night. It was agreed that cement rates had been advanced until they are almost prohibitive in the west. They also want transportation rates on cement looked into by the railway commission.

A PIONEER DEAD

Mr. William Grigg, of Concession 3, Carleton Place, Was in His 86th Year.

A BOSTON HEIRESS TO LABOR IN LABRADOR

Gives Up Life of Luxury to Nurse in One of Grenfell's Hospitals.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 28.—To give up a life of luxury and become nurse in one of Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell's hospitals in Labrador, is the plan of Miss Amelia Forbes, daughter of the late J. Malcolm Forbes, the well-known yachtsman and capitalist of Boston. At present Miss Forbes is training for her chosen profession in the Waltham Home for Nurses, and when she completes her course she is to start for the north and begin her duties among the Eskimos, Indians, and fishermen. Miss Forbes first became interested in the work of the Labrador Medical Mission while attending a lecture by Dr. Grenfell, and she volunteered her services.

ROW AT SYDNEY, N.S. ENDS IN FATALITY

One Negro Killed In a Shooting Affray Amongst Steel Plant Employees.

Sydney, N. S., Nov. 29.—Another shooting accident occurred here last night at the Coke Ovens District. During a disturbance among the colored residents of the district a colored man named Johnston was shot and killed by another negro, whose name is not known to the police. Five arrests have been made in connection with the case by the police. The shooting occurred near the shack inhabited by the colored employees at the steel plant.

BIG POWER PROJECT LAID BEFORE TOWNSHIP COUNCIL

D. A. Stewart Wants Municipalities to Pay a Share in the Cost of Making Important Improvements to County Bridges.

(Special to the Advertiser.)

Altona, Ont., Nov. 28.—Mr. D. A. Stewart, of London, who is promoting the London and Western Railway, and also the proposed big power project at Rock Glen, interviewed the municipal councils of East and West Williams in regard to a number of important matters. In East Williams two bridges will be affected, and the approach of another. Mr. Stewart, who has been thoroughly and by a chart showed how the municipality will benefit.

At the McCallum bridge, raising the approach will be all that is necessary, and Mr. Stewart pointed out that in this, as well as in the other cases, the grading of the flats or approaches to the bridges, will to a great extent eliminate the hills now existing and turn them into easy grades, thus improving the highways of the township.

The Waters bridge, which is the only wooden structure involved, will have to be rebuilt in a short time, and the company get together and build the concrete piers now, as they will be necessary when a new bridge is needed.
