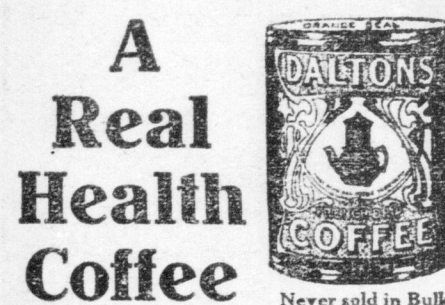

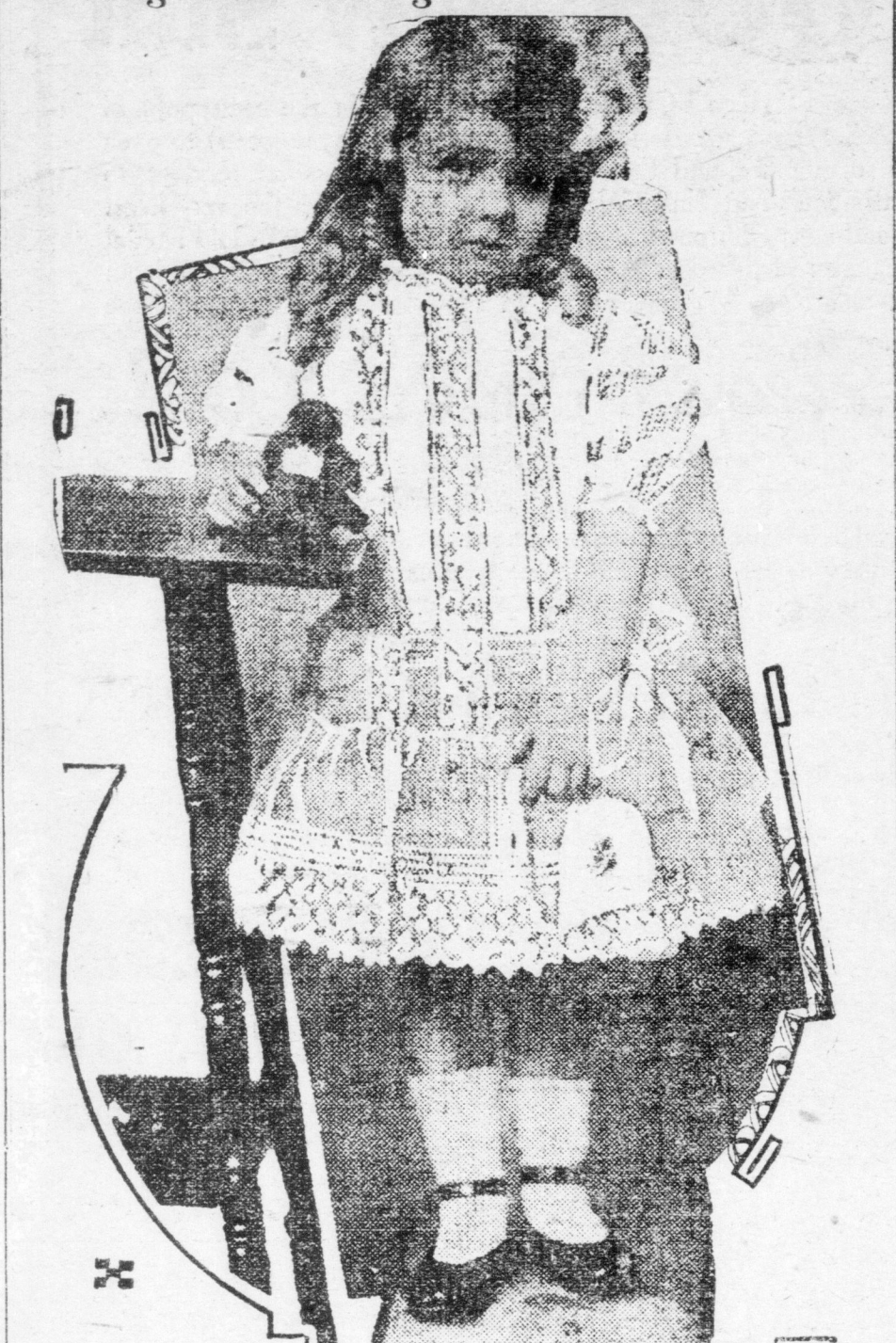

Babies' Clubs.

Complexion Queries.
Dear Miss Grey: Would you kindly answer my friend and I who are interested readers of your paper:

1. Is witch hazel harmful to the face?
2. Could you give me a cure for blackheads which turn to pimples on face?
3. What could I do to close the open pores?
4. Would you advise cold cream for use on face? If so, could you give me recipe for (if possible), a greaseless one?
5. Is talcum powder or pure rice powder injurious?

A-1. No.
2. Wash the face, every night before retiring, with hot soapy water and a rough face cloth. Rinse twice in lukewarm water. Then apply a little of the cream to the skin. Then touch the spots freely with a bit of cotton dipped in this lotion: Precipitate of sulphur, 1 dram; tincture of camphor, 4 ounces; rosewater, 4 ounces. It would also be wise to take a mild laxative each night or morning to clear the system.

3. Spray several times daily with this: Astringent wash: Alum 40 grains; almond milk (thick), 3 ounces; rose-water, 3 ounces.
4. This cream is not hard to make and is said to be a very good one: Sweet almond oil, 2 ounces; rosewater, 2 ounces; spermaceti, 2 ounces; white wax, 2 ounces. Break the spermaceti and white wax into tiny bits; put them into a bowl, and set over a dish of hot water. As they soften pour in the almond oil slowly. When the mixture has softened well lift the bowl from the hot water and stir in the rosewater, slowly beating it. Do not let the mixture become hot. Drop in a little of your favorite perfume, and pour into a small jar.

A-1. Make a paste of lemon juice and oatmeal. After soaking the hands for ten minutes in warm soap lather, rinse once or twice and rub liberally with the paste, allowing this to dry. Do this each night and wash in warm water in the morning. 2. There are novels and novels. Some give altogether false and silly ideas of life, and so are unwholesome for girls of your age to read, because you do not know enough of real life to discern between the false and the true. 3. I suppose you mean a six o'clock supper? How would this do—Cold sliced ham or tongue, potato salad, newly-made tea biscuits, preserves, date cake? Here is a recipe for the cake: One-half cup of brown sugar, 2 eggs, one-half cup milk, one and three-quarters cups flour, 2 teaspoonsful baking powder, one-half teaspoonful each of cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves and salt, half pound butter, cut into pieces. Mix well together, beat for three minutes, and bake for forty minutes.
