PLEDGE HONOR TO HOLY NAME

2,500 Members of Society At-
tend Rally At St. Mary's
Church.

Large Delegations Are Present
From St. Thomas and
West Lorne.

Some 2,500 members of the Holy Name Society of the eight parishes comprising the London district of that society in the London Diocese gathered for their annual rally at St. Peter's Cathedral grounds at 2:30 Sunday afternoon, and marched to the Church of St. Mary's, where an open air service, at which the grouped societies renewed their pledges, was held.

London Diocese is divided into eleven districts, the London district, which is under the direction of Right Rev. Monsignor McKeon, D.P., being made up of the parishes of St. Mary's, St. Patrick's, Holy Angels' Church, St. Thomas, and the parishes of Strathroy and West Lorne.

The devotion of the day began with the reception of Holy Communion by the members of each parish society, in a body, at one of the earlier masses.

To enable the societies outside the city to reach London in the afternoon, the Right Rev. Administrator Monsignor O'Connor had authorized the pastors of the diocese to have only low masses said in their churches.

Attend Holy Communion.
At St. Peter's Cathedral, as at the other churches in London, the Holy Name Society went to holy communion at the 8 o'clock mass, of which Rt. Rev. Monsignor O'Connor was the celebrant. Rev. F. G. Brennan delivered the sermon to the visitors at this mass, and was also the speaker at the afternoon service.

At 2:30 o'clock the Holy Name members, having formed four abreast behind parish standards, marched to St. Mary's Church in the following order: St. Mary's, St. Patrick's, St. Thomas, West Lorne, Strathroy, Holy Martin's, St. Michael's and St. Peter's.

St. Mary's Society was headed by the Slater Band of the 7th Regiment, and St. Peter's Society was led by the Marconi Band, under the direction of Prof. P. V. V. Junior Holy Name Societies and Catholic Boy Scout Troops were also in the procession.

From Dufferin avenue the marchers proceeded down Wellington street, Queen's avenue, Adelaide, King and Lyle streets.

Erect Altar on Lawn.
On the lawn at St. Mary's Church an altar had been erected, the room in the church being inadequate to accommodate the crowd, which entirely filled the spacious lawn.

Father Brennan spoke on "The Divinity of Christ." In beginning his sermon, he referred to the miracle which St. Peter had performed on the steps of the Temple, a short time after Pentecost.

On that occasion the saint, in healing a man, said: "Silver and gold I have none, but what I have I give thee, in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, arise and walk."

Continuing, Father Brennan spoke on a text taken from the Acts of the Apostles, 3:6, the words of which are: "Neither is there salvation in any other, for there is no name under Heaven given to men by which we must be saved."

The speaker then went on to describe the various factors in the life of the time of Christ which were exposed to him. He mentioned, in this connection, Herod, the Synagogue, the intellectuals of the day, public opinion, judiciary, the scribes and the Pharisees, and the false patriots and politicians.

"All memory of them has disappeared," said the priest, "except in so far as they are recalled in connection with the name of Jesus Christ, in the honor of which, these thousands of men gather here today."

Make Act of Faith.
They were gathered, declared the priest, to make a public act of faith in the divinity of the Son of God made Man, and, in addition, to make an act of public protest against all forms of dishonor to the Holy Name of Jesus.

At the conclusion of the sermon there followed the renewal of the common pledges of the Holy Name Society by all present.

Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament followed, given by Monsignor T. West, D.P., of Holy Angels' Church, St. Thomas, assisted by Fathers V. Tobin and T. Moran of St. Thomas.

The Holy Angels' Cadets Band of St. Thomas, under the direction of Daniel Black, led the Holy Angels' Cadets of St. Thomas and the members of the Holy Name Society of St. Thomas.

TRAVELERS WILL ASSIST IN CANVASS

Commercial Men To Aid in
United Welfare Cam-
paign.

London has been divided into 24 districts by the Ontario Commercial Travelers' Association for the purposes of their house-to-house canvass, on behalf of the United Welfare Campaign. Each district will be canvassed by a captain and a squad.

At a meeting of the captains, Saturday afternoon, final arrangements for the canvass were made. It will be held on Saturday and Sunday, June 17 and 18. On Saturday afternoon the travelers will meet for luncheon at the Tecumseh Hotel, given to them by a public spirited citizen.

A short procession of the travelers will be held and they will then visit every home in the city distributing literature and subscription cards.

On Sunday afternoon the travelers will again visit the homes of the citizens to collect subscriptions.

For several years the Commercial Travelers have undertaken this charitable work, and their efforts have continually met with success.

It is hoped by the travelers, that any one not subscribing in any other of the canvasses, such as the factory or industrial canvass, will reserve their subscription for the travelers.

Members of traveler's associations in Toronto or Montreal, who are in the city representing out-of-town firms, are invited to assist in the work of canvassing. If they should wish to do so, they may communicate with George T. Holt, secretary of the Commercial Travelers' Association, in the offices of the organization in the Dominion Savings Building.

HOLDS ANNUAL EXCURSION

Elk Lodge From Detroit Pays Visit to Owen Sound.

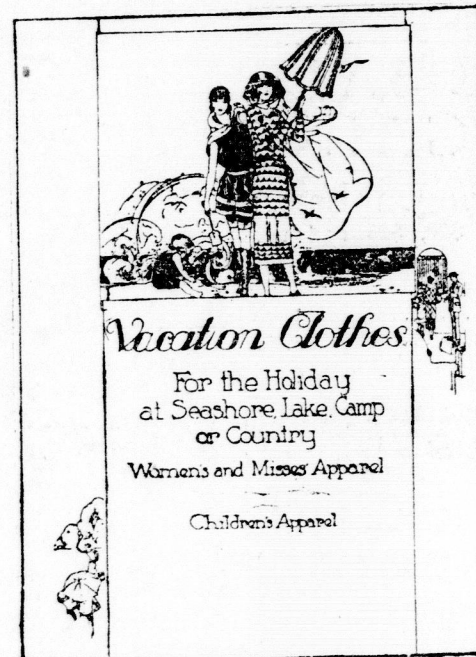
