Building May Be Built On Present Site of Public School.

MAY COST \$300,000

One complete collegiate in the east end of the city and an eight-room addition to the technical high school is the building program of the board of education for this year.

The collegiate is to be erected on the present site of the Rectory street public school, subject, of course, to the approval of the department of education, and providing the necessary funds are supplied by the city

Whether or not the Rectory street school is to be torn down immediate-ly, to make way for the new collegiate unit, or whether property adjacent to the school will be purchased and the public school building left standing for possibly five years, re-

mains an open question.

The addition to the technical school will cost \$70,000, half of which is to be borne by the provincial govern-nent and half by the local board. To price was fixed for the collegiate, though the cost was estimated by different members of the board at all the way from \$200,000 to \$300,000.


