ALREADY TALKING STANLEY  
CUP AT OTTAWA.

Ottawa, Dec. 28.—The Ottawa Club  
wired transportation yesterday that

BERLIN YOUTH'S SUDDEN  
DEATH.

The funeral of Gordon Polzin, the  
nineteen year old son of Mr. and  
Mrs. John Polzin, 114 Elgin street,

Mary's Church, thence to the Catholic  
cemetery.

The deceased had been employed in

on Tuesday morning, in the best of  
spirits and apparently in good health.  
On Thursday morning he was found  
dead in bed by his sister-in-law,  
Mrs. F. Heiman, 189 Bloor street.  
Heart failure was the cause of death.  
The remains were brought home for  
burial on Friday afternoon.

Will Issue Manifesto.  
Sun Yat Sen Accents Pendency of  
Republican Provisionally.  
Shanghai, Dec. 30.—Dr. Sun Yat  
Sen, after having received a definite  
report of his election to the presi-  
dency of the Republic of China by  
the delegates of the eighteen prov-  
inces in convention at Nanjing, spent  
the afternoon here yesterday in  
close conference with his advisors.  
There is reason to believe that the  
personnel of a cabinet will be an-  
nounced almost immediately and that  
it will be representative of all sec-  
tions holding the confidence of the  
people of China. Among these select-  
ed is Chen Chin Tao, who has accept-  
ed the portfolio of Minister of Finan-  
ce. The president will select Gen.  
Li Yuan Hong as Minister of War.  
After the selection of the cabinet the  
president's proclamation will be  
issued. This will outline the policy  
of the new government, offer terms  
to the Manchus for restoring order  
throughout the country, encouraging  
the re-opening of trade everywhere  
and guarantee the safety and protec-  
tion of foreigners. Within a day or  
two President Sun will move to Nan-  
king, from which place all official  
business will be transacted.  
The Associated Press is assured that  
it is not the intention of the presi-  
dent to urge decentralization, but  
on the contrary that a strong central  
government ultimately will be form-  
ed. The present government is prac-  
tically a military dictatorship and  
there is every evidence that Dr. Sun  
is the most competent man available  
to head it.

STIRRING TIMES FOR U. S.  
Washington, Dec. 30.—Sweeping  
changes in the tariff will be proposed  
by the Democratic majority in the  
House as soon as it gets to work next  
month. The Republican administra-  
tion have also big changes in the  
process of being framed up, based  
on reports from the so-called tariff  
commission. But the Democrats will  
not wait for the administration bill,  
—they have the majority and they will  
go on their own lines. The leaders of  
the Democrats have decided on sweep-  
ing reduction in the direction of a  
revenue tariff as against a wing of  
the tariff, who want many of the  
main items in the present tariff plac-  
ed on the free list. Within six weeks  
the whole United States will be in the  
greatest tariff ferment it has ever ex-  
perienced.

On top of all this is the stirring  
movements now in evidence in either  
party over their respective presiden-  
tial candidates. Woodrow Wilson, two  
moderates, as against the old-timers  
like Taft or Roosevelt, or Harmon (a  
Democrat).

The most marvelous thing of the  
situation is the strength of progres-  
sive ideas. Any man in the limelight  
is a revolutionary to-day (as an exam-  
ple), compared to what he was  
eighteen months ago. Wilson is  
for referendum, for recall. The big in-  
terests are getting the shake-up of  
their lives.

Citizens' papers were granted in  
Detroit to Miss Mabel Griffith, former-  
ly of Essex, Ontario, who is now a  
law student and who expects to be ad-  
mitted to the Michigan bar next June.  
Walter Egbert, aged nine, was ac-  
cidentally shot and killed by Albert  
Ternarsch at Pembroke yesterday.  
The boys were going pigeon shooting  
and were examining the guns in a  
shed.

While feeling her way across the  
kitchen floor Mrs. Matilda Guichen  
of Windsor, blind woman, aged 82,  
fell through a trap door to the cellar  
and sustained injuries that caused  
her death almost immediately.

Worried by business trouble, Fred  
Belles, 40 years old, a clerk  
employed by the law firm of Singer &  
Singer, Toronto, was found dead in  
his bed last night. An empty bottle of  
carbolio acid was found beside him.

Mrs. Belle Banished.  
Lisbon, Dec. 29.—The Government  
has issued a decree banishing for two  
years Mr. Anthony Mendes Bello, for-  
merly of Lisbon, the Bishop of  
Guadalupe and administrator of the  
diocese of Oporto, from their respec-  
tive districts. The ground on which  
the banishment is based is persistent  
opposition to the organization of cul-  
tural associations.

It was reported recently that the  
Government would prosecute Mgr.  
Bello on a charge of conspiring  
against the Government. The name of  
the creation of new cardinals, it be-  
ing thought that he was likely soon  
to receive the red hat.
