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"If trouble breaks out in the Mexican ports and it is seen that the Mexican authorities are unable to protect German citizens, Germany would exercise a clear right, which has ever been unreservedly recognized by the United States, to send warships thither. But this would be far different from mediating in the internation-

affairs of Mexico.

"Even if the present troubles lead to a complete revolution, and even if the United States is invited to annex that country, or undertakes its annexation without Mexican consent, Germany certainly would not be a Don Quixote and whip out the paper."

"The United States agrees or disagrees is their own affair. No danger threatens the Monroe Doctrine from our quarter. It makes no difference to us whether it sleeps in the archives or is used to our detriment."

The above statement was called forth, as an answer to insinuations of the English press that Germany was watching for an opportunity to interfere in Mexico.

FOR MILLIONAIRE

Clarence D. Hillman of Seattle
Found Guilty of Using United
States Mails for Fraudu-
lent Purpose

SEATTLE, March 10.—Clarence D. Hillman, the millionaire townsite promoter, was found guilty of using the mails to defraud by a jury in the federal court today. The jury, which was out twenty-four hours, acquitted Hillman on the first five indictments, charging a misdemeanor, and convicted him on thirteen counts of the sixth indictment, charging a felony.

The thirteen counts on which Hillman was found guilty is five years' imprisonment and \$1,000 fine, making a total of 55 years' imprisonment and \$13,000 fine.

Hillman had already been found guilty of contempt of court for tampering with jurors summoned to try his case, but sentence was deferred pending the trial of the criminal charge, the court holding that it might prejudice the case to sentence Hillman for contempt while the criminal trial was pending.

As soon as the verdict had been read counsel for Hillman gave notice of a motion for a new trial. Pending further proceedings in the case Judge George Donworth increased Hillman's bond from \$30,000 to \$100,000 and remanded him to the custody of the marshal until bail was furnished.

Hillman appeared before Judge

In the sum of \$100,000 signed by M. R. Backus and J. A. Swailwell, bank officers, and Mrs. Swailwell. The bond was approved and Hillman was given his liberty subject to the condition that he report in person to Judge Donworth every morning at 10 o'clock.

DEPOSITORS SECURED

President Barnett and His Wife Give Up Property For Washington

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, March 10.—Captain E. T. Barnett, president of the defunct Washington-Alaska bank, which went into the hands of a receiver, January 5, and Mrs. Barnett signed an agreement today whereby the depositors in the bank are secured against loss. Captain and Mrs. Barnett agreed to give trust deeds on property owned by them in Mexico, business property in Fairbanks and interest, rentals and royalties received

The agreement also provides that the depositors are to receive six per cent interest from the date of the closing of the bank until final settlement is made. It is generally believed that the Barnetts will arrange to pay off in full in a short time rather than pay the heavy interest charges.

The depositors have already received a sixteen and two-thirds per cent dividend from the bank.
