Subsibilary High Court powers.

SUBSIDIARY HIGH COURT POWERS.

Sec. 1.—The subsidiary high court is the source of all legitimate authority of the ancient order of foresters in the Dominion ancient order of foresters in the Dominion of Canada. It possesses exclusive jurisdiction and power, subject, however, to such laws as reserve certain rights to the high court of the order.

To establish, regulate and control the forms, ceremonies, written and unwritten work, and to provide for the safe keeping and uniform teaching and dissemination of the same.

To provide and furnish all lecture books,

dispensations, emblems, certificates, clear-ances, and such other goods or parapherna-lia as may be necessary for the uniform working of the order.

To provide for the distribution of all pass-words, and regulate the mode and manner of using the same, and to prescribe such regulations as may be necessary to secure regulations as may be necessary to secure the safe and easy intercourse and indentification of the brethren.

To establish the order in the Dominion

of Canada where the same has not been inof Canada where the same has not been instituted.

To provide a revenue, by means of a per capita tax on each subordinate court, and charges for supplies furnished.

To provide for annual and other returns from each district and subordinate court under its jurisdiction.

To hear and determine through its final arbitrators all appeals from district or subordinate courts not in district, in accordance

ordinate courts not in district, in accordance with the regulations of the order.

To enact laws and regulations of general application to carry into effect the foregoing, and all other powers reserved by these laws, to the subsidiary high court or its executive council, and such as may be necessary to enforce its legitimate authority over district and subordinate courts under its jurisdiction. risdiction.

To grant dispensations to district courts;
o define the territorial extent of their
