The First Seciety of Authors.

A society for the protection of authors was founded as long ago as 1785. Authors themselves were not members of the society, which was insti-tuted for their benefit by noblemen and gentlemen, who subscribed 2 guin-eas annually in addition to an en-

trance fee of 10 guineas.

Their purpose, as defined by themselves, was "to assist authors in the publication and to secure to them the entire profits of their own works"that is to say, they published books, but took no fees for doing so. They were amateurs, however, engaged in trade in competition with professionals, and their enterprise was unsuccessful. The society was wound up in 1749, and the balance in ha was presented to the Foundling hospital.-London Author.
