but flowly, through the channel leading into this spacious port; lying in a direction N. 61 E. and S. 61 W.; it is nearly a league in length, with fome rocks and breakers lying at a little distance from either shore. Those on the southern side were furthest, detached, and most conspicuous, especially one, about a mile within the S. W. point of entrance, which seemed to admit of a passage within it; but we had no opportunity of ascertaining that fact, nor is it of any importance to the navigation, as the main channel appeared to be free from any obstruction, and is of sufficient width for the largest vessels to turn in. Its northern shore, composed of high steep rocky cliffs, is the boldest; the fouthern side is much lower, though its fouth-eastern point is formed of steep rocky cliffs, from the base of which a tract of fandy country commences, extending not only along the fouthern shore of the channel, and fome distance along the exterior coast to the fouthward, but likewise to a considerable height on the more elevated land that borders thereon; and interspersed with huge massly rocks of different fizes, which, with the Farellones, renderthis point too conspicuous to be mistaken. Having passed the inner points of entrance, we found ourselves in a very spacious sound, which had the appearance of containing a variety of as excellent Vol. II. ĥarbours
