HORRID MURDER.

A MOST disbolical murder was committed in Amherstburg, (Canada west) on Tuesday night, the 27th July last. A woman named Mertha Newson was found dead in her bed on Wednesday morning, with her throat cut and mangled in a shocking manner. Her husband was the first to mention the occurrence to James Kevill, Esquire, the Coroner, who immediately summoned a jury to inquire into the circumstances of the case, which resulted in the committal of the Lusband of the deceased, who is now in custody. On his way to jail, he disclosed the names of three other per-Bons, as participators in this revolting tragedy who were immediately apprehended, and are also safely lodged in jail. Their names are David
Sharp, William Learning, and Margaret LangThe manner in which the murder was perpetrated is almost too inhuman to describe; but it is said, that while thece of the parties held the unfortunate woman, the fourth cut her throat with a razor, and having fainted in the act, the instrument was taken out of his hand, and the bloody deed completed by one of the parties who held her. It is said that Learning is respectably connected, but that he had been discoved by his family on account of his dissolute and intemperate habits. The prisoners will be tried at the next Fall assizes .- Western Herald.
