

2. (a) What were the profits from CANEX operations at CFB Esquimalt for the fiscal year (i) 1978-79 (ii) 1979-80 (b) what proportion of the profits were remitted to the department for (i) buildings (ii) maintenance (iii) utilities (iv) salaries for managers, supervisors and accounting services (c) to what specific uses are the profits put?

**Mrs. Ursula Appolloni (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of National Defence):** 1. Yes. Public support is provided in the form of accommodation in otherwise vacant buildings, basic management and accounting services in accordance with Treasury Board decision 689194—guiding principles for the provision of services and recreational facilities at Canadian Forces establishments and the provision of support to the Canadian Forces exchange system and associated non-public funds organizations. Staff support to CANEX consists of one officer and two other ranks on a full-time basis and one officer, five other ranks and one civilian employee on a part-time basis.

2. (a) The total net profits after all expenses including the remittances made to the Crown as listed in Paragraph (b) below were:

(i)	\$102,366
(ii)	96,647

(b) (i), (ii) and (iii)

1978-79—\$29,480.71

1979-80—\$42,544.46

These figures are based on an annual review of all CANEX operations across Canada.

(iv) No remittance was made to the Crown for salaries of the staff listed in Paragraph 1 above.

(c) In both 1978-79 and 1979-80, 10 per cent of net profits were reinvested as working capital in the CFB Esquimalt CANEX operation. The remaining 90 per cent were contributed to the CFB Esquimalt base fund, for the provision of base recreational, amenity and community programs.

#### PUBLIC AFFAIRS BUDGET OF AECL

**Question No. 1,909—Mr. Waddell:**

What is the total amount and breakdown of the public affairs budget at AECL, including employee expenses, exhibits and displays, literature and films, programs for schools and specific projects such as the Nuclear Information Centre at the Manulife Centre in Toronto, including the set-up and operating costs?

**Hon. Marc Lalonde (Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources):** Atomic Energy of Canada Limited reports as follows:

1980-81

Chalk River Nuclear Laboratories	\$226,000
Whiteshell Nuclear Research Establishment	\$231,000
Nuclear Waste Management Program (WNRE)	\$598,000
Nuclear Information Centre in Toronto	\$140,000.

These figures included employee expenses. However, the accounting systems at AECL's sites are not maintained in such a way as to provide a breakdown for exhibitions and displays, literature and films and programs for schools.

In addition to the above-mentioned funds, public affairs of a corporate and international nature are funded from commercial revenues. These include work in support of marketing.
