LABOUR CONDITIONS

INCREASE IN UNEMPLOYMENT

Mr. Dave Nickerson (Western Arctic): Madam Speaker, in the single month of November an additional 55,000 jobs have been lost in Canada. There are now officially 1,438,000 Canadians who are out of work. Therefore I move, seconded by the Hon. Member for Prince Edward-Hastings (Mr. Ellis):

That this House has absolutely no confidence in the Liberals' handling of the economy and condemns the Liberals' six and five policy of fighting inflation through massive unemployment.

NECESSITY TO CONTROL PORNOGRAPHIC ENTERPRISES

Inasmuch as the struggle for decency in society is national and not just municipal, I move, seconded by the Hon. Member for Cariboo-Chilcotin (Mr. Greenaway):

That this House urge the Attorney General of Canada to meet with provincial counterparts to develop legislation which will represent the people's interests in eliminating this indecent trade, and relieve municipal councils of the burden of attempting to control pornographic enterprises without the backing of law.

LABOUR CONDITIONS

NEED FOR MEASURES TO ADDRESS PROBLEMS OF THE UNEMPLOYED

Mr. Stan Darling (Parry Sound-Muskoka): Madam Speaker, since the presentation of the budget of November, 1981, the number of people out of work for six months or more, that is the long term unemployed, has risen 124 per cent, and the total measured unemployed now nears the 1.5 million mark. The Government's response to this has been to attempt to create 60,000 short term jobs for these long term unemployed while sacrificing an undisclosed number of permanent jobs in the process. Inasmuch as the depth of winter is a particularly bad time for the unemployed, and that the Government has repeatedly stated that methods to improve the situation will be taken only in its projected spring budget, I move, seconded by the Hon. Member for Prince Edward-Hastings (Mr. Ellis):

That this House request the Minister to bring forward measures now not only to address the problems of the winter unemployed but also to convince the Canadian public that we who sit in this place do have their welfare at heart in a way that is more than crassly political.
