Given our own trade minister's embarrassment over the fact that his government actually provides assistance to farmers, and given the refusal of the Minister of Agriculture refusal to defend Canada's true level of support, can the minister guarantee that the trade minister will not give up and will not further reduce support to Canadian agriculture and add even more to Canada's give-up list?

Hon. John C. Crosbie (Minister for International Trade): Mr. Speaker, as the House has noticed, Canada already has a very widely admired offer on the table at Geneva with respect to agricultural matters which, if accepted by the other people engaged in negotiations, will do a great deal for Canadian agriculture.

The hon. gentleman should be trying to put some pressure—and God knows he can't exert very much—on the European Community which has thrown a road-block at the whole process of reform of agricultural trade in the world. Why does he not direct a question to the east—
