ANOTHER BUILDING

AT GUELPH COLLEGE

Enrolment of Students Easily

Eclipse All the Pre-

vious Records.

GUELPH, Sept. 30.—(Special.)—

Another new building will be erected

to add to the new in course of

construction and the already large

group of buildings at the Ontario

Agricultural College. This will be a

three-story building, which is now

being erected on the site of the old

building. It will be built of brick

and will contain a large hall, a

lecture hall, and a number of

classrooms. The building will be

completed in the spring of 1914.

There are at present 413 students

enrolled at the O.A.C., the largest

number ever enrolled at one time. Of

this number the freshmen or first

year class, make up more than one-

half, there being a class now in re-

freshman year. This year, however,

several more to come. This beyond

double establishes the O.A.C. as easily

the leading agricultural college of the

province. The fourth-year, or

senior class of 50, is also the largest

graduating class in the history of the

college.
