50,000 UNCLAIMED WAR MEDALS.

In two large strong rooms at Woolwich Dockyard, Woolwich, Eng., are stored nearly 50,000 unclaimed South African medals. Each is engraved with the name of the man to whom it was awarded. These men are not now with the colors, but a staff of clerks and a department armed with medals and regimental records are endeavoring to trace them.

Many of this lost legion are irregulars who flocked to the British colors when the war broke out, but who have since become scattered all over the world. One young man, for instance, after the war, went prospecting in the interior. He turned up recently at Cape Town after an absence of nearly ten years and asked for his medal. It was given him. Similar demands from all parts of the British Empire are received nearly every week.

Hundreds of medals have been reposing in regimental safes since 1914. At the end of ten years, according to the King's regulations, these still unclaimed will be broken up and the silver debited to the mint. Many men have refused the medal on the ground

Snakes and Sense.
Even since the serpent in the Garden of Eden double-crossed Eve, the have of men have been swatting the snake, regardless.

But now appears Prof. H. D. Bailey of Muhlenberg College in Pennsylvania with a word directed especially to farmers. He urges farmers to resist from indiscriminate snake swatting. "What is more," he says, "the professor wants to put some of the snakes into the song-bird class, which is to say, he wants them protected by legislation because of their cooperation with mankind in warfare on pests detrimental to man's agricultural purposes."

Here is a list of the professor's special privileges snake: the king snake, milk snake, bull snake, fox snake, indigo snake, corn snake, and common water snake. These are the professor's word for it, that these snakes are harmless to mankind, and are really benefactors because they destroy rodents and many insects.

As a matter of actual scientific fact, there are very few venomous snakes in North America, but nevertheless a terrible aversion and prejudice among normal persons against the whole snake kingdom. What Prof. Bailey says is doubtless well founded in common sense. It may be a practical absurdity to swat a friend, even if he be a snake. Nevertheless we doubt very much whether legislation can be successful in removing so universal a prejudice.

When it comes to legislating in the snake's behalf his nuptials is unable to the oldest law in the world according to which he has no business eating a goose. The snake bugs anyhow. According to Genesis all the snake has any right to eat is dust, and if he had been following orders he wouldn't be here now.

Musiel Mud As Fertilizer.
Around Prince Edward Island deposits of musiel mud have been encountered from five to 25 feet deep, and this is now being extensively taken for use as fertilizer. This material is the organic remains of countless generations of oysters, mussels, clams and other shellfish. The shells, usually more or less intact, are found imbedded in dense deposits of a mud-like substance, and this combination is a fertilizer of high value and potency. It supplies lime and organic matter, besides small quantities of phosphate and alkalies.

So far as reform consists in the enforcement of the law, he says, it is supported by the majority of successful lawyers; but so far as reform has come to mean a tendency to political or economic reorganization, it has to face the bulk of American legal opinion. The existing political order has been created by lawyers and they naturally believe, somewhat obsequiously, in a system for which they are responsible and from which they benefit.

believed devoutly that the constitution, which created the problem of slavery and provoked the anti-slavery agitation, was adequate to its solution.

In the same spirit learned lawyers now affirm existing problems can be easily solved. If only American public opinion remain faithful to the constitution. But it may be that the constitution, as well as the system of local political government built up around the Federal Constitution, is itself partly responsible for some of the existing abuses, evils and problems; and if so, the American lawyer

may be useful, as he was before the Civil war, in evading difficulties; but he will not be very useful in settling them. He may try to settle them by decisions of the supreme court; but such decisions—assuming, of course, that the problem is as inextorable as was that of the legal existence of slavery in a democratic nation—would have precisely the same effect on economic and political conditions. They would merely excite a crisis, which they were intended to avert, and strengthen the hands of the more radical critics of the existing political system.
