# LATITUDE ALLOWED **FARMERS IN REGARD**

Must Report to Miller by Middle of Month, if They Have Excess.


### **NEED NOT RETURN IT**

Order of Canada Food Board Makes Specific Ruling.

The World has received many inquiries from farmers living considerable distance from town, who have on hand a supply of flour in excess of the amount permitted under the orders of the food board, issued March 12 and April 26, 1918, respec-These orders in effect pros vide that a person living not less than two nor more than five miles from a licensed flour dealer can have in his session only enough flour to meet ordinary requirements for 30 days. A person living more than five and not less than ten miles from a licen-sed flour dealer can have in his possession enough flour to meet his orrequirments for 60 days, and a still larger quantity was permitted to a person living at a greater dis-

As a matter of fact many farmers lay in their supply twice a year. In some cases the farmer takes the wheat to the mill and has it ground into flour for his own use. Not un-naturally many farmers who have several months for the new course more than the required amount on shortly to start at the Royal Military May 17, 1918, by the terms of which the farmer with an excess of flour on hand has only to report the excess to the miller or merchant from whom he purchased the same, provided he does so by June 15. The order reads

"A bona-fide farmer shall be per whom it was manufactured, the ex-cess amount held by him. It shall then be the duty of such miller or to report all such holdings to the Canada Food Board on forms to supplied, and at such times as he directed."

London, June 3.-The drain of man power, the fall in the numbers of births and the loss of the population thru sickness and under-feeding is felt more severely by the central feit more severely by the central powers than by the peoples of the entente.
