

IN SESSION IN AURORA

Thomas Urquhart Elected Moderator-Little York Real Estate Advances.

AURORA, June 11.-(Special.)-By the unanimous vote of the delegates to the thirty-third annual meeting of the Toronto Association of Baptist Churches, which opened here this morning, ex-Mayor Urquhart of Toronto was unanimously chosen as moderator for the ensuing year, in succession to Rev. J. D. Freeman. Thomas McGillicuddy was for the nineteenth time re-elected as secretary.

The morning session was opened by Prof. Tracy, who dealt briefly with the general state of the work of the church. The afternoon meeting was opened by the reading of the church letters, the report of Clerk McGillicuddy, and general discussion relating to the progress as shown during the official year just closed. In all departments the Baptist Church has shown substantial gain.
"The Inner Life of the Church" was the subject of an address by Rev. A. R. Park.

A lively discussion arose over the presentation of a resolution adopted by the Baptist Ministerial Association, relating to and favoring the appoint-ment of an advisory committee to work with the churches in respect to the ordination of young men. It was urged that candidates for the ministry were not infrequently admitted to the church only thru a desire not to injure the feelings of the candidate in question.
