BOY SHOTS MOTHER.

Little Fellow Had Got Revolver From Open Drawer.

MONCTON, N.B., July 18.—(Special.)—Shot by a revolver in the hands of her five-year-old son, Mrs. Sanford Anderson of Edgett's Landing will die.

Mrs. Anderson, who was in delicate state of health, was sitting at a desk, in which her husband kept a loaded revolver. In securing writing material, she left the drawer containing the revolver open, and her little son took the weapon out.

His mother turned and saw him. As she reached to take the little fellow, he pulled the trigger and the bullet entered his mother's abdomen.

GIRL DROWNS FROM CANOE.

Irene Haldane of Ottawa Loses Life in the Canal.

OTTAWA, July 18.—(Special.)—Irene Haldane, 30 years of age, who lived with her mother on Rideau-street, was drowned in the canal this afternoon.

She was canoeing alone, and the canoe upset.

She was in the water 30 minutes before she was taken out.

Two Boys' Narrow Escape.

GUELPH, July 18.—(Special.)—Two young lads had a narrow escape from drowning crossing on the G.T.R. early this morning.

The boys, accompanied by their brother, several years younger, were on the G.T.R. when the train was about to start.

The engine struck the rear end of the vehicle, smashing it to kindling wood and hurling the boys into the air.

The boys were not seriously injured but a few bruises and severe shock.

EXPRESS CO. NOT SALOON.

Objects to Having 600 Employees Handling C. O. D. Liquor.

KANSAS CITY, July 18.—In arguing a mandamus suit brought by a liquor firm to compel the Adams Express Co. to carry C. O. D. express packages to Iowa, W. A. Scarritt, attorney for the company, said:

"Our company has 325 offices in Iowa. The state has passed a law placing a tax of \$600 for each office where C. O. D. liquor packages are delivered, showing the intent of the legislature to prohibit the traffic. Now in these 325 offices we have 600 employees, young men, who are clean, reputable, first-class young men. Are you going to let us keep them and give them the opportunity of making a good living, or are you going to give them the state law of Iowa, or giving up their positions? Where are we going to get agents after we have compelled them to do that, for I have no faith in these 600 young men seeing their way clear to make bartenders of themselves and push their noses up the door of the Iowa state penitentiary. When they leave our employ we will have to look among the crooks and crooked and the disreputable element to find men who are willing to break the state law."

"The way the liquor houses deal in C. O. D. packages makes virtually a saloon of the express office in the small town. It has become so bad that even some railroad companies have refused the express companies offices in their depots."

BRITAIN THANKS U.S. FOR AID AT JAMAICA

Note Intimates That Governor Sweetenham's Allegations Were Unfounded.

WASHINGTON, July 18.—Formal thanks and recognition for the efficient aid rendered to stricken Kingston at the time of the earthquake last January by Rear Admiral Charles H. Davis, U. S. N., and the officers and men of the Missouri, the Indiana and the gunboat Yankton, has been received by Secretary Root.

The message conveys the thanks of the present governor of Jamaica, and serves to repudiate the action of former Governor Alexander Sweetenham, who had charged the British admiral with the murder of the British consul, Mr. H. Newberry, in the earthquake.

"I have the honor to state that your note of May 1, intimating to me on behalf of the Jamaican Government, charges laid against the government of Jamaica for the stores sent to Kingston by the American Atlantic Fleet at the time of the earthquake, was communicated by the embassy to the governor of the island."

The governor has now requested me to convey to you and thru you to the United States Government an expression of his sincere thanks on behalf of the Jamaican Government and the sufferers for the articles so generously and promptly supplied and to express his grateful appreciation of the action taken by the president and the congress in declaring that no charge would be made against the Jamaican government in consequence of the issue of these stores."

WILL APPEAR ON MONDAY.

Alleged Counterfeiters to Be Committed for Trial.

LINDSAY, July 18.—The preliminary hearing in the counterfeit case will open on Monday afternoon next at 1 o'clock, before Police Magistrate Jackson and Moore. After sufficient evidence has been adduced, the accused Judge J. E. Harding at the criminal assizes. Separate information has been sworn charging each of the men with having had counterfeit money in his possession. The maximum penalty is 14 years.

John Goelzin, the horse owner, and George Miller, will plead not guilty on Monday. The former will be defended by E. J. Wilder, and the latter by G. H. Hopkins. Crown Attorney A. P. Devlin will be aided in the prosecution by Edward Barry, solicitor to the attorney-general.

John Ewald, the Grand Trunk fireman, was brought here to-day by Detective J. E. Rogers and lodged in jail.

DECAPITATED.

Awful Death at London, Henry Jenkins, a G. T. R. Employee.

LONDON, July 18.—(Special.)—Henry Jenkins, a Scotchman employed by the Grand Trunk, was decapitated in the local yards to-night.

Jenkins was riding on the rear car of a freight being backed down the tracks, lost his hold, and was thrown on the rails directly in front of his car, his head being caught in the track.

C.P.R. CROP REPORT.

Rain Has Fallen in Some Places Where Badly Needed.

WINNIPEG, July 18.—The Canadian Pacific Railway Company report that the state of affairs to be prevailing throughout the west. The most satisfactory part of the report is that many districts, which had been suffering for lack of rain, have however, still received a few showers, and that for that reason crops are forecasted in these districts are generally good.

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GOVERNMENT PLANS CLEANING UP

Messrs. Turgeon, Prevost, Roy and Tessier Likely to be Retired.
