**Baldie and Jones Will Be Prosecuted for Careless Discharge of Rifle.**

**MAN KILLED AT CANADA FOUNDRY.**

**Mayor Chisholm and Other Officials Attended Funeral of Late Lieutenant-Governor.**

Toronto Junction, April 22.—Fifteen Italians have been engaged by Contractor Charles Gibson to work on sewer connections. The Toronto Junction Gun Club will hold its first shoot of the season tomorrow afternoon. John Baldie and Lorenson Jones of Davenport will appear at the Police Court on Tuesday to answer the charge of discharging a rifle and wounding Mr. Riddiford, who is now in the Western Hospital. Henry McFarlane, Franklin avenue, fell 60 feet, from the roof of a four-story building at the Canada Foundry Works, today. He was carrying a large pile of broken bricks, and his head was cut and his ribs were smashed. He collapsed in a few minutes at the foot of the building. He was taken to St. Michael's Hospital. McFarlane was a carpenter, engaged in putting a roof on the new building, near a very-tenant, Ont. Coroner Crawford will hold an inquest at the hospital tomorrow.

A special meeting of the Town Council will be held tomorrow night, to give three readings to the Packing Company's by-law.

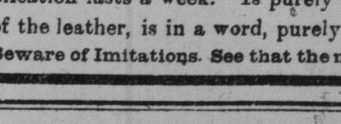
