Montreal, Nov. 8 .- (Special.) - The anual banquet of the Montreal Bar Asociation, held last night at the Windsor Hotel, was one of the most brilliant unctions ever held in that well-known ostelry. The occasion was enhanced eau, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, and John G. Milburn, president of the New York State Bar Association, and Col. Mimms, representing

The Chief Justice spoke of an important question referred to on that occasion. Speaking of changes then advocated in the statutes creating the Supreme Court, he had expressed the opinion that confederation had not created the necessity for appeal in 'cases wherein the civil law of each province was exclusively involved. Uniformity of Jurisprudence is desirable, and in fact, can exist only upon the class of cases wherein the laws are uniform through the Dominion. He thought then each province should have, as it always had before Confederation, its own civil law cases disposed of within the province by its own judges. The opposite seemed an admission of inferiority, a renunciation of home rule and the abandonment of a most important civil right. He declared that he held the same opinions to day as he did in 1878, on his appointment to the Supreme Court bench. He was more than ever convinced that the present system was irratiomal, anomalous and opposed to the spirit of the constitution.
