

PREMIER HEARST'S BONUS ANNOYS CIVIL SERVANTS

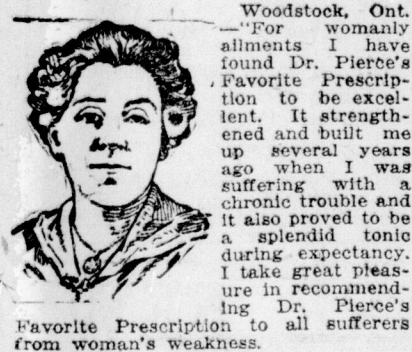

UNITED FARMER CANDIDATE WINS IN MANITOULIN

Benjamin Bowman Defeats Conservative by 290 Majority.

GAMEY'S FORMER RIDING

Initial Contest of United Farmers' Association Signal Victory.

GORE BAY, Oct. 24.—Returns received here early this evening indicate that Benjamin Bowman, the United Farmers' candidate, has been elected to the Provincial Legislature, defeating B. H. Turner, the Conservative nominee. His majority is given as 290, with two polls—Killarney and French River—still to hear from.

Little Current, Turner's home town, went strong in his favor, giving him 241 votes, and Bowman only 40. Spring Bay, which is Bowman's home town, gave him 108 votes over Turner. Espanola, on the mainland, gave Turner 50 of a majority.

Bowman was formerly a Liberal, but he was nominated by the United Farmers of Ontario. The local Liberal organization at the beginning of the contest disclaimed having anything to do with his campaign, so that the contest was an out-and-out battle between the Conservative party on the one hand, and the United Farmers of Ontario on the other. Mr. Bowman is a Manitoulinite.

By-election in Manitoulin was made necessary to fill the seat made vacant last year by the death of the Conservative member, R. E. Gamey, who was first elected in that constituency in 1902, and represented the riding continuously for fifteen years.

ROOSEVELT SAYS MISCHIEF LURKS IN "14 POINTS"

Wants American Senate to Demand Unconditional Surrender.

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Oct. 24.—Theodore Roosevelt sent telegrams tonight to United States Senator Lodge, Polk and Johnson, in which he characterized the "fourteen points" as "thoroughly mischievous" and "principles" as "a basis for a peace satisfactory to the United States."

"As an American citizen I must earnestly hope that the senate of the United States will take affirmative action against a general peace with Germany and in favor of a peace based on the unconditional surrender of Germany."

"I also declare against adoption in their entirety of the fourteen points in the President's address of last January as offering a basis for a peace satisfactory to the United States."

"Let us dictate peace by the hammering guns and not chat about peace to the accompaniment of the clicking typewriters. The language of the fourteen points and the subsequent statements explaining or qualifying them is neither straightforward nor plain, but it is confused in its probable sense many, and possibly most, of these fourteen points are thoroughly mischievous, and make the basis of a peace, such peace would represent the unconditional surrender of Germany, but the conditional surrender of the United States. Naturally they are entirely satisfactory to Germany and equally satisfactory to this country's satisfaction to every pro-German and pacifist and Socialist and anti-American so-called internationalist."

DUAL MONARCHY SOON WILL MAKE FULL SURRENDER

Vienna Dispatch to Frankfort Predicts Speedy Developments.

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 24.—(By the Associated Press).—The speedy unconditional surrender of the Austro-Hungary monarchy is probable, according to a Vienna dispatch to the Frankfort Gazette.

PLENTY OF VACCINE IN DAY OR TWO FOR PROVINCE'S NEEDS

Demands for Nurses and Doctors Are on the Increase.

TORONTO, Oct. 24.—"The provincial board of health is working day and night to get the influenza vaccine," said Chief Medical Officer Dr. J. W. S. McCullough today. "When it is ready it will be simultaneously sent to all medical officers of health in the province, as well as to the military and naval forces. An ample supply will be ready in a day or two."

"Demand for nurses and doctors from outside the city are increasing. In Toronto the demands are not so great as they were a few days ago. Three 'S. O. S.' nurses were sent to Guelph yesterday."

Toronto, with 31 deaths from Spanish influenza and pneumonia, recorded an increase over yesterday. Ottawa and Hamilton also report a slight increase in the death rate. In the former city they numbered 24, as against 22 Wednesday. Hamilton had 8 deaths and 15 new cases. The number of cases in Ottawa is practically the same.

HENSALL ESCAPES.

HENSALL, Oct. 24.—There were no services in the churches on Sunday on account of the notices sent out by the provincial and local authorities to guard against influenza. We are pleased to say that Hensall is very free of it, there being hardly a case of it here. Those who had it, it appears, contracted it by being in other places where it had been spreading. The few who had it are now recovering rapidly.

ST. CATHARINES, Oct. 24.—After a ten days' illness, the last four days of which he was unconscious, Dr. Elsie Jessop, M.P.P., died at 7 o'clock this evening at the age of 75 years. He first suffered an attack of influenza which his vigorous constitution resisted, but his heart was unable to withstand the reaction. He had occupied a seat in the Ontario legislature on the Conservative side for 20 consecutive years.

LAMBETH TO HAVE BOARD OF TRADE

LAMBETH, Oct. 24.—A board of trade will be organized here this winter. The Lambeth people do not intend to lie down, but will develop plans and stay on the job. There is a future for Lambeth, they declare.

INGERSOLL, Oct. 24.—Pte. James Wall, according to official word received today by Mrs. Wall, was wounded in the left leg in recent fighting. He was one of the first men to enlist with the 168th Battalion.

\$22,000,000 INCREASE IN SAVINGS DEPOSITS IN CANADIAN BANKS

OTTAWA, Oct. 24.—Savings deposits in Canadian banks have increased by another twenty-two million dollars. During September they reached a new high level with a total of \$1,027,498,230. At the end of August they were \$1,014,711,855, a figure which then constituted a record. Curious, the increase during August was also approximately twenty-two million dollars.

The September returns also show an increase in bank circulation and an increase in demand deposits.

HENSALL, Oct. 24.—Pte. Francis William Jones, who enlisted from Clinton, and whose wife and family are residing here, has been recently wounded in the knee by gunshot. His wife received a cable the first part of this week to that effect. 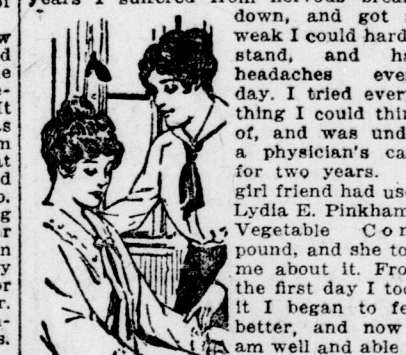
