## BISHOP FALLON AT DIAMOND JUBILEE OF STRATFORD CHURCH

STRATFORD, Nov. 26.—The diamond jubilee of the laying of the corner-stone of St. Joseph's Church was celebrated here today with special musical aid. In addition to a large number of the laity, upwards of forty of the clergy of the diocese were present.

Rev. M. F. Fallon, bishop of London, preached at the high mass, dealing at length with the history of the Catholic Church.

"Persecution will ever follow the Catholic Church," he said. "You must be prepared for it. The days of degeneracy would indeed be upon the church if we could find no evidence of persecution."

It had been intended to dedicate memorial tablets to Bishop Crinan, parish priest when the church was erected, and to Dean Kilroy, former pastor, but these tablets could not be completed, owing to influenza among the workmen. The dedication will take place at a later date.

## LONDON HARDWARE MEN LEAD WAY IN BARRING HUN GOODS

An absolute ban on German-made goods was unanimously decided upon last night at a meeting of the London Hardware Merchants' Association. The members without dissent passed a resolution stating that they would not handle any German-made goods, nor would they buy from any jobbing house which handled goods of Hun manufacture.

It was also decided to submit the resolution to the London Chamber of Commerce in the near future.

## CHURCH EXTENSION KEENLY DISCUSSED AT DEANERY MEETING

Missionary Apportionment of Parishes Also Taken Up.

## GOOD REPORTS HEARD

Nearly Every Parish Has Subscribed For the Memorial Victory Bonds.

Church extension within the bounds of the deanery, missionary apportionment of the parishes, and the report on the Victory bonds purchased by the Sunday schools as war memorials, constituted the chief business discussed yesterday at the meeting of the East Middlesex Deanery Association, held in the schoolhouse of the Church of St. John the Evangelist, and presided over by Rural Dean A. L. Beveridge.

At 2 o'clock the meeting of the branch of the W. A. held a meeting in the same building, joining with the deanery representatives 230 to hear an address from the Bishop of Huron on the revision of the prayer book, and a report on the revision of the general synod held in Toronto from a lay delegate, R. E. Davis.

Concerning church extension, the question was brought up of establishing work in Knollwood, where it was pointed out that the Presbyterian Church has been doing work for a number of years, and that it is at present enlarging and strengthening its work. Under the circumstances it was decided to take no steps for the present at least.

Encouraging reports were given of the work that is being done in Manor Park and Chelsea Green, a layman, Mr. Heathcote, looking after the services in the former, under the direction of St. James' Church and Rev. Prof. Wright in the latter.

Every parish reported stated that one or more Victory bonds had been subscribed for by their schools as war memorials to the members who have fallen in action. The war bonds being purchased will go towards an endowment fund for the support of Indian missions in Canada, a responsibility which the missionary society of the church in Canada is taking over entirely from the church in the motherland in 1919.

R. E. Davis, J. K. H. Pope and Mr. Mitchell were appointed a committee to interview the laymen of the deanery parishes with a view having the full missionary apportionment met.

In the course of this discussion of the General Synod, Mr. Davis referred particularly to addresses from two chaplain bishops, Bishop Richardson of the Maritime Provinces, and a bishop of the American church, Bishop McCormick. Both made a strong appeal for closer union of the churches, as did the Archbishop of Rupert's Land, the primate of all Canada. The other returned chaplains, referred to the eagerness of the men overseas for the return to the peninsula, and the fact that the British and other Allied soldiers have borne the brunt of the fighting and are consequently willing to take a back place for them.

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With regard to the work among the foreigners in Canada, it was stated by speakers at the synod on the importance of Canadianizing the foreign-born and making them understand and appreciate the standards of the country of their adoption.

Sketching the long slow process of the revision of the prayer book, with which he has been associated as chairman for the past ten years, Bishop Williams related the interesting fact that the revision movement was initiated many years ago by the Diocese of Huron under the late Bishop Baird.

## EVENING GATHERING

Following the East Middlesex Deanery Association meeting held Tuesday afternoon in the parish hall of the Church of St. John the Evangelist, an open meeting of the Deanery Sunday School Association in the evening attracted a much interested gathering.

Election of officers for the coming year, a recommendation to the establishment of teacher-training classes in connection with each of the schools, and discussion re the obtaining of accurate statistics from each of the schools occupied the greater part of the time allotted to business.

The association endorsed a recommendation from the committee on teacher-training, drafted as a result of conference with the executive committee of the deanery, to the effect that teacher-training classes in each of the schools be established instead of an institute in the city. Rev. G. W. Latimer drew attention to the advisability of securing better statistical reports from the schools. On motion of Mr. Latimer, seconded by Mr. Rice, the association secretary was asked to communicate with the superintendent and secretary of each school in order to obtain an accurate report of the coming year.

## COMMITTEE DECIDES TEACHERS OUGHT TO RECEIVE INCREASE

Recommends Rise For Members of Collegiate Staff.

Salaries, as far as they concerned the members of the London Collegiate staff, was the sole business taken up by No. 3 committee of the board of education yesterday afternoon.

After some discussion it was decided that the committee would recommend that the salaries of the staff be increased for two years to all members of the staff, no distinction being made between male and female teachers.

Principal W. T. Mooney of the Collegiate will receive \$5 per evening for acting as principal of the night school. He explained to the board that as he was responsible for the work done at the night school it was absolutely necessary that he be present at the school every Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings.

It was arranged that some latitude should be allowed in the minimum salaries to be paid heads of departments and their assistants. Following the scale recommended by the committee: Heads of departments, \$1,500 or \$1,600, with an annual increase of \$100 till the maximum of \$2,200 was reached. Special assistants' minimum will be from \$1,600 to \$1,800, with an annual increase of \$100 till \$2,100, with the annual increase of \$100 till \$2,000 is attained. The leave in the minimum was decided on, as often capable men had to be turned down owing to the small stipend to start with.
