Work Likely To Commence Early in the Spring.

"Work on the new medical school building will start as early as possible," said Mayor C. R. Somerville this morning in reference to the building of the Medical School. He thinks that London has displayed wisdom in carrying the delay with such a large majority.

A meeting of the Medical School committee will be called immediately, and will report to the board of governors. The land is already purchased, in fact, it has been for some time. Regarding the plans of the building, Mayor Somerville says that while the school authorities have formed a definite plan as yet been adopted.

"No matter what the cost of the building may be, the city of London will not be asked to put up another cent beyond the \$100,000 provided for in the by-law," said the mayor.

It appears that certain taxpayers objected to the plan, but the mayor said that the amount was not sufficient to put up the building. They feared that the building would be started and then when it was found that the money was short, the city would be asked for a larger amount. Mayor Somerville said that he was confident the amount will be sufficient to erect the building, but he was confident that the city will not be asked for more money for the building.

As soon as the plan can be prepared the tenders will be called so that the work may be commenced early in the spring. It is the intention to have it completed this year.

I just forgot the number, but it was a few blocks from the centre gate of the park, and almost across from a Ward school. The house has since been taken down and rebuilt. I was in your city one of the occupants, and in the fall of the year, as far as I can remember, Mrs. J. E. SOMERVILLE.
