Mr. Spracklin told of the roadbayes of the border cities, where illegal houses of the border cities, where illegal liquor business appeared to be running without restriction when he entered upon his duties as license inspector, and he said that as many as six loads of liquor passed his home every day.

tion to put a stop to drunkenness in that town, but the council turned the that town, but the council turned the matter over to the police committee, and the latter's investigation of the local police was a farce, which Rev. Mr. Sprackin refused to recognize. He had endeavored to co-operate with License Inspector Mousseau, and the license department, he said, with a view to stopping the illicit business in the hotels and the rum-running. Inspector Sprackin said that on one occasion when he and his men stopped a big motor car, one of the occupants said he was a provincial officer and showed his badge to substantiate this. This officer afterwards apologized. On the night in question he had sworn at Mr. Spracklin and threatened to report him to Chief Provincial Constable
