A. states that if a person is convicted of selling liquor in his home, his house will not be considered a private dwelling place until one year has passed, therefore it would be unlawful to have liquor there during that time. To prevent people from evading the act by moving to another place of residence, an amendment was made to the section last session, which makes it unlawful to keep liquor in any other place in which they might reside.
