

This was the conclusion of a re-sume of the conditions affecting the necessaries of life in Germany as given to The Associated Press today from a to The Associated Press today from a high authoritative source. The speak-er proceeded to explain the handicaps under which Germany had labored in the current year. The combined wheat and rye crop of 1915, he said, was 4.000.000 tons below that of 1913 and 2.000.000 tons below that of 1914. The oats crop was but 6.000.000 tons; as against 9.000.000 tons in 1914 and 10,-000.000 tons in 1913. The clover crop In 1915 was the worst in a decade, say 5.000.000 tons below the preceding two years.


