# **BROADWAY CROWDS COWED BY PISTOLS**

Bandits Rob Jewelry Stores on Broadway in Full View of Hundreds.

New York, March 12 .- While Broadway tonight was crowded with the-atregoers, three armed bandits smashed in the window of a jewelry store at 37th street, kept the crowds at bay with their revolvers until they had emptied the contents of several trays into their pockets, and then escaped, shooting one pedestrian who attempt-
